of Cranleigh Joy Horn brings some anecdotes of 100 years ago

What was happening in Cranleigh in March 1917?

here was excitement among farmers this month when the Board of Agriculture allocated a motor tractor to Surrey, in order to improve the production of home-grown food. They watched with great interest as its performance was tested in various parts of the county. This tractor, with its 25hp engine, was first tried out with a plough at Stoke Park Farm, Guildford, in the charge of two soldiers, acting as driver and ploughman. The heavy tractor was not entirely satisfactory on the heavy soil there, and the farmers' verdict was that a somewhat lighter tractor would be preferable. On lighter soil, it could dig four furrows at once. This was the first use of a motor tractor in Surrey.

The pioneering motor tractor and plough then moved to Mr Boorman's farm at Send. It was so valuable that it was worked non-stop, twenty-four hours a day, ploughing ten acres in that time. There is no record of what model of tractor it was, but the

Fordson and the Saunderson tractors were around in 1917, and give some idea of what it would have been like. Ploughing with horses continued right up to the Second World War, because of the expense of investing in a tractor, but the future clearly lay with

The desperate need to increase food production was on everyone's mind. The bishop of Winchester declared that people were at liberty to work on Sundays for this purpose, but that they should also go to church. However, if they had a bad conscience about working, they should not do so. The Cranleigh parish council announced that a four-ton truck-load of seed potatoes had been ordered for the parish. Meanwhile, at the Guildford sewage farm, twelve German prisoners-of-war started work clearing

land for planting potatoes. The men who normally worked there had all enlisted, and only two women were left.

An editorial in the Surrey Advertiser suggested that bakeries and dairies should combine their deliver-

ies to release men for national service. In Kingston, bakers were considering stopping the delivery of bread, pointing out that the price of bread would be less for the customers, if they fetched it from the shop. Cranleigh bakeries and dairies made a feature of their delivery services, with several local



At the New Park Farm Dairy, they delivered produce twice a day dairies making two milk deliveries per day.

On 20 March, the Hambledon Tribunal had a few Cranleigh men among the cases which it considered for exemption from national service. George Pirie, 38, married, baker at the St Andrew's Bakery on the Common, was allowed three months before being obliged to join the armed forces. The same was granted to Samuel Mann, ironmonger and house furnisher, director of David Mann's. However, I have not found evidence that either of them actually served.

News came that Sergeant Tom Warner of the 2nd Queen's was seriously wounded and dangerously ill, having had his right arm amputated. His home was 'Hobart' in Mount Road. As he was a traction engine driver in civilian life, this operation must have raised serious questions as to how he would be employed when he left the army.

People Profile



A real pest out of control

'Some people you meet don't seem to have any direction or sense of purpose in life, whereas others, when they find it, just take off and soar like a bird!'

eter grew up in Ewhurst, where he has lived for about twenty six years or so. He grew up in a family home where he was brought up by his mum primarily – with three sisters: two older, Anna and Leona, and one younger, Tamsin.

"I actually got bullied a lot at primary school by a group of my classmates. I struggled with some of the lessons and I had Tourette's on top of being dyslexic so I ticked a bit. My nerve spasms meant I got picked out from the rest and I became very anxious and stressed. I'd never felt like that before and I remember the bullying started around year 5 and 6, when my dad was on the path to leaving.

I started working with local gamekeepers and on farms; Murray Butler from Bowles farm invited me to come up and help out with the farm labour - which I loved. My family used to go on a lot of camping holidays when I was younger to the New Forest which is where I got this love for the outside and animals - birds in particular. I've loved birds ever since I was young, and I've got pictures of me as a lad, chasing chickens around and holding doves and pigeons in Trafalgar square.

After Primary school, I moved onto Glebelands School where I was a student for about two months. It was such a short amount of time because the bullying intensified and I was in a class with people I didn't know. I was split up from my friends that


helped me to be sensible, which had a big impact on me. I didn't feel that the teachers were fair and I ended up getting a lot of detentions.

The detentions seemed to last forever, and I ended up with my first month of playtime gone. I ended

up thinking: "well, if that's the case, then there's no point in me coming here" I didn't enjoy school and all these detentions meant I had no fun at break times.

It was at this point that I befriended a jackdaw, when I wasn't going to school. I fed it for four days and it was eventually eating out of my hand and treating me like its mother. It soon became my pet.



Social services got involved, then eventually the police too. I ended up climbing onto the roof when they came round to get me, throwing tiles at the police cars.

From that point, things just spiralled out of control. I opened myself up to a lot of other things. I ended up staying in a cell overnight which was an experience.

I ended up travelling up to London with my mum to have a meeting with a specialist about my Tourette's. I remember that the specialist was busy when we arrived and we ended up waiting for four hours. On the third hour, I stormed in - kicked the door open - and yelled "When are you gonna start seeing us? We've been sat here for ages and I've had enough!"

Turns out she was in a very official, important board meeting with several other doctors and she was quite peeved that I'd burst in like that, telling my mum to "control your child!"

They prescribed Diazepam which I started taking. On the first morning I had a severe reaction to it and was rushed to hospital in an ambulance for treatment.

I was then put on medication that would work well under supervision while I was in care, and placed in a children's home in Bognor Regis for about six months. I ended up getting involved with the older children there who encouraged me to steal cars and take drugs with them, so I was transferred to one-to-one care.

When that didn't work out, I briefly stayed at another boarding school before I was placed in foster care up near Kingston. I remember my mum coming to see me at weekends to pray for me which I found comforting at the time. I hadn't really found

Jesus at that point, and was a pretty difficult child when I was taken to church - I remember cutting seats up at the back, with a pen knife. I was sent to another children's home and then to

a boarding school before being put back into oneto- one care. By this point I was fed up. I had been through about 10 -13 different places and was then told I would be moved again. I just climbed up a telegraph pole and threatened to jump into the wires. I had a good view of birdworld so I said "Go away, I'm staying here. I'm happy here".

When they finally got me down, I was taken straight to a high security building for troubled youths where they took my jackdaw away. I couldn't even walk out of my own room without a key card and I had to be let out to go to the toilet. I remember


being in there when the twin towers went down on September 11th and they let us watch the news unfold on the TV. There were mainly girls in there and I was pretty much the only guy so it was guite lonely.

When they realised I wasn't suicidal, I was allowed to move on to Stepping Stones - which is a rehabilitation home for children. I was at the point of despair and I had started wondering what life was really about when my mum gave me a children's bible to read. There's not much to do when you're locked in your room all day so I started reading about the miracles that Jesus performed. I was inspired to reach out and pray "if you are there, and you're real and willing, please change my life - and I promise I'll live my life in a way to please you."

I was in the home for at least a year before I came out and came off my medication. I honestly don't believe it was medication that helped me keep calm as much as the physical activity, and not eating so many sweets! I think people underestimate the effect what you put in your body has on your mental state.

By the time I was released, all my peers were finishing their GCSE's at the time, so I went back to Mr Butler who gave me a job helping out as a farm hand for about £35 a day.

Social Services then helped me get into Merrist Nood where I did a course on countryside management. This was a stepping stone to Sparsholt College in Winchester who specialise in game keeping. It was in Sparsholt that I completed a course in Pest Control, receiving a distinction for ny effort.



I used this knowledge to combine my farm work during the week with pest control for family and friends at weekends, before realising I was earning more money from my weekend work than I was during the week! I put two and two together and decided to start my own Pest control business, PGH.

At the time I was attending Cranleigh Baptist church where I met Paul Higgins. I told him about my trouble getting PGH off the ground and he suggested the Princes Trust.

My initial application was refused. Once I gave them more details about my situation, I was told they'd be happy to help.

The Trust placed me on business courses and I also started business networking with Paul who picked me up early in the morning and took me to Croydon for these events. I went along about 6 or 7 times, drumming up business before subsequently joining the branch in Cranleigh.

I did so well on the enterprise business course with PGH that I got nominated for the national "Princes

Trust celebrate success" RBS Award 2013. The award was based on turnover, business plan, employees, branding, website, growth of the business, and the company ethos. I ended up winning the award, and it was presented to me by Prince Charles. You always think it will never happen to you and I . . . couldn't believe it. Even my dad was in the audience, he'd taken the train and accompanied my mum and me. You could hear him shout: "YES!" when my name was announced - so it was a happy time for me.

My real motivator was the prayer I made in that children's home, years before. I felt that I had God behind me, driving me to succeed in something that he wanted me to do.

After a couple of years running the business, I realised that there was a problem in the way that pest controllers were treating honeybees at the time, and I knew that honeybees were on the decline because of this. I decided to niche into environmentally friendly pest control to provide a bee-friendly option, and I started Beegone - a subsidiary of PGH that focuses on bee removal. I have around 9 employees now, including myself.

I had the fantastic opportunity to meet the Queen in 2015 when I was invited back for the 40th anniversary of the Princes Trust, and we had a great conversation. I showed her the Queen Bee we had in our display and told her "We've got two queens in the room today!"

I am thankful for my faith, to my mum for her prayers, and to God for answering them.

Crane Spotter: tales from a Cranleigh birder

The jewel in the crown



And now? Well, if I have my way, that seven foot high garden misfit will be allowed to live! Forever!

Things have changed. I love it.

After all those years it has finally paid for its keep. Early one morning as I was nipping down to the shed I heard a high-pitched call - 'zit zit zit.' A breakthrough moment.

I knew the call could only be one thing - a little bird the weight of a 5p piece — but where was it? I strained my ears but could not be sure if it was in the crown of the oaks or somewhere else. I heard the sound again: 'zit zit zit'.

My pulse was racing. It was really hard to tell where it was coming from. I looked above and around but there was no sign of the caller. Would I fail to see it before it inevitably flitted out of the garden? Or would I have a moment to treasure with arguably the crown jewel of the British birding world?

Again it called, this time much nearer, and out of the corner of my eye I detected a movement in the rhododendron about only four feet away from me. Then nothing. Blast! Then a quick movement again in the shadows at the base of the bush.

It manouvred like a mouse. Momentarily I saw a bit of the tail. Then as it hopped through the branches a bit of a wing came into view. Come on boy – show yourself! I feared it would fly but suddenly, after a few more seconds, its head came into view as it popped up onto a branch.

And there it shone in all its glory. It viewed me briefly, and unimpressed, as it moved swiftly on. I had to check it out quickly to make sure it wasn't its near cousin - the Goldcrest. But the broad stripe of its supercilium, like a white diamond above its eye, plus its golden bronze shoulder patches, gave the game away for sure. Just like I'd hoped. Firecrest! Oh yipeee!

This was the first I've ever found in the garden. One reason is that this species has, until the turn of the century, been relatively rare in Surrey. And locally too.

The other reason is that they are, after the Goldcrest, our smallest bird. Even tinier than a Wren. And they move so fast they are easily missed. They don't pose for selfies like a Robin or Blackbird, The call, and the song, can be a giveaway but for many the high frequency makes it impossible to hear them.

People therefore have to rely just on binoculars and even then risk a strained neck and a cricked back as they look directly up high into a tree where maybe a Firecrest is hunting.

Of course, the best idea is to lie on your back and look through your 'bins' vertically upwards. But few are prepared to look so silly or to risk attracting unwanted attention from a passing dog.

So there the bird was after a cool 29 years of me hoping and looking. Bird species number 96 for my garden! I felt elated as I watched it with my naked eye. It was so close I could almost touch it.

But then just 30 seconds later, after snatching all the microscopic insects it could tease from that rhododendron, it flicked back up and out of view into the tree canopy. Firecrests are constantly on the move to get the food they need to keep up their calorie count.

This beautiful species may, with patience, now be found in the Surrey Hills. But it was only an occasional visitor and passage migrant until the turn of the century.

I saw my first local one on Holmbury Hill, and others since, including breeding season birds. Then the singing males raise their fiery orange crowns Mohican-style to court females in a stunning acrobatic display.

My last sighting was low in a front garden hedge in Ewhurst when I was unsuccessfully following up a report of Waxwings six weeks ago. I've looked out for 'my one' since - but with no luck.

Maybe he's slipped in and out a few times without me connecting. Or he could be on the Continent. Or maybe he's in your garden – right now!

Fast food on the Run

Cooking everyday for yourself or the family, can be a full time job and sometimes leaves us just rushing about in a frantic hurry to eat something. Now here's a quick treat for four.



INVOLTINI DI SALMONE E CETRIOLO (Salmon and cucumber rolls)

Serves Four People

Ingredients

4 Large slices of smoked Salmon 160g fresh salmon, minced 4 thin slices of cycumber cut leng

4 thin slices of cucumber cut lengthways (use a potato peeler)

50g of cucumber, finely chopped

20g of white leek or shallots, finely chopped 10 ml olive oil

25g of mayonnaise

15 mls of balsamic vinegar

2 lemons, quartered & deseeded

Juice of one lemon

Salt and pepper mill & some dried dill

Preparation

- 1. Mix the fresh salmon, chopped cucumber, leek shallots, mayonnaise, oil, vinegar, salt and pepper, and dill, until a paste is formed
- On a clean surface, place the smoked salmon with the sliced cucumber on top. Cut into 4 even slices

- Place a quarter of the salmon paste at the end of each salmon slice and roll to form a cylinder
- 4. Repeat for each slice
- Arrange on a serving dish with two lemon quarters at each end of the rolls and sprinkle some lemon juice on each one
- 6. Serve as desired



COSCIOTTI DI POLLO AL POMODORO E PEPERONE (Chicken thighs in tomato & pepper sauce)

Serves Four People

Ingredients

8 Chicken thighs with skin 1 medium sized red onions, finely sliced 1 yellow pepper, finely sliced

2 sticks of celery, finely chopped

4 cloves of garlic, crushed and finely chopped

500g tomato passata

120 ml of dry white wine

4 bay leaves

1 bunch of basil, roughly chopped

50g plain flour

30 ml of olive oil

30g of butter

Salt and pepper mill

Preparation

- 1. Season the flour with a sprinkle of salt and pepper, evenly coat the chicken and leave to rest in a cool place
- 2. Heat the oil and butter in a large frying pan
- Shake excess flour from the chicken and fry in the fat, turning it frequently until golden brown
- 4. Leave to rest in a warm place



- In the same fat, fry the onion, celery, pepper, and garlic
- When the onion is translucent, add the wine. Reduce by half then add the passata and the bay leaves
- 7. Cook rapidly, stirring continuously
- When really hot, add the chicken making sure it is covered by the sauce. If not, add more passata. If the sauce is too thick, add a little hot water
- 9. Place the mixture in a casserole dish and cook it in a hot oven at 160°C for 40 minutes
- 10. When done, place the chicken pieces on a suitable serving dish. Cover with the sauce, removing the bay leaves and sprinkling the basil over to finish
- 11. Serve with new potatoes or boiled rice and a mixed salad

MACEDONIA INVERNALE (Winter fruit salad)

Serves Four People

Ingredients

For the Fruit Salad:

1 medium sized orange

3 limes

1 grapefruit

2 kiwis

1 mango

3 satsumas

300 ml of stock syrup

Some caster sugar may be required

For the Stock Syrup:

200 g of granulated sugar 150 mils of boiling water 1 coffee spoon of vanilla essence

Preparation

For the Stock Syrup:

- 1. Dissolve the sugar in the water over a medium heat, bringing it to the boil.
- Add the vanilla essence and leave to rest away from the heat until cold

For the Fruit Salad:

- Skin the citrus fruit with a sharp knife, removing the pith and peel.
- 2. Cut into equal pieces and place in a serving bowl with the stock syrup
- Peel and cut the other fruit into similar sized pieces, adding a little caster sugar for sweetness if desired
- 4. Serve with pouring cream and shortbread biscuits





Thursday 16 March: SLOW WEST is a critically acclaimed western made in New Zealand (standing in for Colorado) by British writer/director John M MacLean in 2015. The film proves the genre can be revived brilliantly in every decade. The title misleads as this work is anything but slow; it is surprising how well known situations are presented with fresh twists. The style resembles work by the Coen brothers or novels by Cormac McCarthy. The narrative is multi layered and the cinematography ravishing. The basic story is somewhat echoing The Searchers; a teen age Scots boy of well to do parents is travelling on the 19th century trails in the West looking for his sweetheart who has disappeared. He is joined by a gunslinger acted by Michael Fassbender, for his money, and later by a bandit played by Ben Mendelsohn. They meet a number of colourful characters and always there is a sense of imminent danger. The boy is acted by Kodi Smit-McPhee who when younger accompanied Viggo Mortensen in The Road which is a Cormac McCarthy tale. Much happens in only 84 minutes.

Thursday 30 March: THE WONDERS is directed and written by Rohrwacher, Alice second work by this interesting German winner of the 2015 Cannes Grand Prix for this film. The story concerns a German couple with five daughters who have settled in isolation, without means, in the Tuscan countryside, to keep bees. The parents want



to reject modernity and bring up their daughters with traditional values. When the government changes the rules for how bees can be kept the family realises it could be bankrupted. Their life is disrupted when a TV film unit turns up to find a model traditional family for a documentary cum tacky game show. The presenter is the super glamorous Monica Bellucci who spellbinds the eldest daughter. Meanwhile the father has agreed to take in a delinguent teenage boy for payment by the parish council. The intrusions upset the family's equilibrium. Unlike SLOW WEST not much really happens but the film casts a spell which stays long in the mind.




