

Joy of Cranleigh

Joy Horn brings some anecdotes of 100 years ago

What was happening in Cranleigh in November 1916?

The local branch of the Church Lads' Brigade started its winter programme with enthusiasm, despite the fact that at least seven of its ex-members had already died in the War, besides others wounded. Physical drill and dumb bell exercises were carried out on Mondays in the Village Hall, rifle practice was held on Wednesdays at the miniature range in Knowle Park, with the Bible class on Thursdays in the Kent House tearoom (over the present Barnardo's shop). There were currently 20-30 members.

The Village Hall was also the venue for the annual general meeting of the Rifle Club. Sir George Bonham of Knowle was in the chair, and declared that 'the benefit of these clubs is being gradually recognised.' It currently had 45 members, most of them from the Voluntary Training Corps – the 'Dad's Army' of the First World War – consisting of men who had failed the Army's medical test or were over the age of conscription.

Mrs Rowcliffe, commandant of Oaklands Red Cross Hospital, appeared before the Hambledon Tribunal, which heard appeals against men being conscripted into the armed forces. She put in a strong plea on behalf of Abraham Osgood, 34, the hospital orderly. He was the only man employed in a hospital of 30 patients, and he worked the kitchen garden of over an acre, looked after twelve pigs, besides poultry, and attended to the drainage system and heating apparatus. An older man simply could not get through the work. Mrs Rowcliffe was a forceful lady, accustomed to getting her own way. Never-

theless, Abraham was allowed only three months. The tribunal seems to have been getting tougher in granting exemptions.



The Cranleigh Women's War Work Committee, meeting in the Schoolroom behind the Baptist Chapel, had produced 1,096 articles for the armed forces in the past year. This included pyjamas, shirts, vests and knitted 'comforts'. 157 workers were enrolled, and attendances had numbered 1,163. It must have been a hive of activity. The women had supplied the needs of Oaklands Military Hospital, and had sent a steady stream of parcels to Friary Court in London, the central depot of the Queen Mary's Needlework Association.

In Oxford, three friends passed a music hall where a show called 'Blighty' was being shown. They commented, 'What a great idea for a song!' Four hours later they had written it. Before long it was being sung in the trenches to gramophones, and throughout Britain. Were the people of Cranleigh singing it too?

Who's who?

On Fire 24/7 - like father, like son

“As I walk about meeting people in the local area, I am sometimes interrupted by the blue, flashing light of a vehicle, driving along the road at great speed. As it passes me I notice big red letters on the side that read, FIRE, and I know someone is on an emergency call. We should be thankful for those men and women who risk their lives for us on a daily basis, especially at this time of year” . . . writes John Spark.

Ben Davis

Electrician and On-Call-Fireman

I have been brought up around the fire service from a very young age, be it Cranleigh fire station or at Gatwick where my father was a firefighter for almost 25 years. Two of my uncles were part of the on-call team at Cranleigh for a number of years and my brother has been in the fire service for over 12 years now. I also have five of our family still serving today, so joining the fire service seemed like the natural thing for me to do.

I love being in the fire service as we all have a really close bond within the station. You form friendships that will last a lifetime through working in some difficult and challenging situations. The camaraderie within the station is fantastic but at the same time we know when to knuckle down and get things done. It really is like having another family.

Over the six years that I have been in the fire service we have been called to some pretty big fires in and around Surrey that I think will always be remembered by myself and my colleagues. But the ones that really stick with us are the incidents where we have helped people who've been unfortunate enough to be involved in traffic collisions.

It's nice to hear back after a week or so that they are on the road to recovery, as that's really in essence why we do the job in the first place - to help.

Stewart Davis

Internal restoration and retired firefighter

Stewart is the father of Ben Davies and used to be a firefighter himself. 46 years ago he moved to Cranleigh when he was around 18 and was married 4 years later to his wife Chris, whom he had three children with. Along with Ben and a girl called Natalie, they had Barry, a full time fire investigator who served to inspire his brother into joining the force.

Stewart didn't start off working for the fire services, his first job was at the local butchers in Cranleigh – Baxters –before he got his wish to join the Cranleigh fire department in 1979. He was an on-call firefighter there for around 11 years, combining his part time hours with a full time job, self employed as a builder.

It wasn't enough for Stewart though, who applied for a full time position at fire departments up and down the country before finally, Gatwick offered him the chance to take the entry exam for a place in the team. He passed and started a job as a full time firefighter in 1986.

It was working there that he encountered every conceivable incident you could imagine, from helicopter crashes to emotional situations like suicide calls. "Working in this job just isn't possible without people skills" he told us.

He was trained as a PTI (physical training instructor), HGV (Heavy goods vehicle), Road Traffic, and First Aid instructor, and passed many qualifications that set him up for life, to save the lives of those around him. "It never goes away" He said "there was an accident outside my house last year and my experience just kicked in and I instinctively knew what to do".

This is a natural instinct that a lot of us lack which is why we look to these brave people for help who take the time to learn it for us.

Even on an off duty trip to the local shops Stewart always carefully parked his car in order to make a quick getaway, to get to the firestation in the event of an emergency call or incident. As a part-time fireman, you only had a certain response time, in which to get there, or the fire engine left without you! He was therefore always on call.

Stewart retired in 2009 but he's still on fire 24/7, ready to jump into action and be there for us. You may just need him this bonfire season. ■



- I live and/or work up to a maximum of 4 minutes from Cranleigh fire Station. (GU6 7AD)
- I have a full current manual driving license valid for UK use (category B)
- I am physically fit

Working shoulder to shoulder with full time firefighters - you will:

- Receive the same extensive training for all types of emergency response situations
- Learn new skills
- Gain qualifications including First Aid and become a licensed Large Goods Vehicle driver
- Respond from Work or Home
- Get paid the same hourly rate as full time firefighters (around £9,000-£10,000 annually).
- Enjoy experiences you'd never imagine
- Be expected to give up approximately 50 hours of your time on a weekly basis.

Being an On-Call firefighter is an exciting, challenging, and rewarding way in which you can serve your

local community in a very real and practical manner. It also makes you a valued and respected member of your community.

The role of the firefighter involves a high level of commitment and personal discipline. You must be able to work as a member of a team and be willing to work hard in arduous conditions.

If you are employed by a company and intend to provide cover during work hours, you will need to get their support and approval for you to be released.

We are keen to take on new people who can offer: daytime or evening and weekend On-Call cover for the Cranleigh area.

The average annual pay is around £9,000 -£10,000 which is optionally pensionable. You will be expected to give approx 50 hours of On-Call cover at different times flexible during the week.

How do I apply?

To register your interest in becoming an On-Call firefighter, please complete and submit the online form at www.surrey-fire.gov.uk. This form is only for the position of an On-Call firefighter.

You must currently live or work up to a maximum of 4 minutes of Cranleigh fire station. If you are eligible to apply, we will hold a recruitment open day.

This event will help you to understand what is involved in the recruitment process for On-Call firefighters, including completion of the application form and an explanation of the On-Call duty system requirements. It is also an opportunity for you to ask questions and have a chat with uniformed officers. If you are successful with your application, the next stage will be psychometric assessments.

Crane Spotter: tales from a Cranleigh birder

November-

Remember, remember – the ‘bonfire birds’

I was sawing off a few more branches to donate to this year’s Cranleigh bonfire when I looked up and saw them.

Just above tree height over the garden was a constant stream of small birds heading determinedly south.

Migration was underway full pelt. There must have been thousands of them involved in this exodus in late September and early last month.

Perhaps millions of these ‘hirundines’ went through over the whole of Surrey at that time in what was a spectacular show to rival anything you see on Guy Fawkes Night. The birds were House Martins. Swirling like confetti over the marriage of summer and autumn.

They are a familiar sight around Cranleigh, nesting often colonially in little mud cups they make under the eaves of houses and other buildings.

House Martin

(Delichon urbicum) fact file:

A declining breeder in Cranleigh
Generally arrives a little later than the Swallow
Earliest reported Cranleigh arrival: 6 April 2000 and 2007

Latest reported Cranleigh sighting: 3 December (!) 1986
(only a handful of Surrey December records)
Scores sometimes roost locally in trees on migration

Largest single flock in Cranleigh: 600+, 24 September 1970

You can see scores of these apparently black and white birds flitting around the village throughout the summer – especially around the High Street, Cranleigh Leisure Centre, Cranleigh School and Cranleigh Preparatory School.

Get near enough and you will hear their distinctive call. I liken it to the ‘zit’ type of noise made by one of those electric insect zappers they were selling cheap at Little Manor Service Station a few months back.

And if you get closer still, or have good binoculars, you will discover the bird’s black cap and back has a glossy hue of blue. The rump and underparts are white while the small-forked tail is black.

Some people don’t like them too close and, as can be seen from wire mesh under the apex of certain High Street rooves, they have gone to a lot of trouble to keep them away. The birds can make a mess but many home owners find that is a small price to pay for the entertainment they get from having these cheery buzzers around.


So, as I was saying, there they were en masse heading over the garden. Caught up with them were Swallows too.

These were not Cranleigh birds – they had come from much farther north – but it got me thinking about 5th November and the population that come from Africa to raise a family in this village.

For they can truly be called the 'bonfire birds'. Each spring they hawk low over the fields looking for nesting material. And Cranleigh Common is their target. There they find what they are hunting for. Mud. The House Martins benefit from a wonderful patch of the stuff, thanks to the Cranleigh and District Lion's Club bonfire.

Who would have thought that as we clean out our hedgerows, gardens and houses to help fuel the bonfire each year we are directly enabling other families enjoy their own homes five months later.



After Victoria-

the ratings war moves on.

Victoria ended its first series on Sunday 9 October still beating Poldark's viewing numbers by around 500,000 on the Sunday night at prime time. Poldark started its current series two weeks later than Victoria but has four more episodes to air. This would appear to give the BBC period story a clear run for rating dominance as Victoria's replacement on ITV, Tutankhamun, may lack the magnetism of the young Victoria (a 3000 year old mummy cannot have the charm of lovely Jenna Coleman!).

The ratings battle is also mirrored on Saturday evening with Strictly Come Dancing overlapping with The X Factor by 25 minutes. In this competition for viewers' attention, BBC is winning quite easily with 10.3 million viewers for Strictly's first full competitive Saturday versus The X Factor at 6.8 million (44.6% of audience share versus 33.0%). The X Factor is actually marginally up on its equivalent rating last year. Even by episode 2, Strictly is showing 8.6 million, which is 1 million up on 2015. The X Factor posted an improvement to 7.1 million in week 2. The new judging team on The X Factor appears to have helped; Sharon Osbourne, Nicole Scherzinger, Louis Walsh and Dermot O'Leary are a stronger support for Simon Cowell. Nevertheless Tess Daly and Claudia Winkleman fronting the dance show on BBC, plus the judges, Len Goodman, Darcy Bussell, Bruno Tonioli and Craig Revel Horwood, are firm favourites, with true staying power, on Strictly Come Dancing.

Whether these direct confrontations between our two giant terrestrial broadcasters will continue is debateable. Advertisers have been very happy with Victoria's pulling power but are increasingly frustrated about losing out to Strictly. The BBC is unlikely to run the third series of Poldark, now in production in Cornwall, against the next series of Victoria which has been commissioned with an eye on the American market where tales of British royalty go down well (Netflix is producing an intended long running drama series on the 60 year reign of Queen Elizabeth).

Meanwhile ITV have scheduled Tutankhamun for Sunday evening at 9.00pm opposite Poldark. The thinking has obviously involved the period nature of the show, being in the decades of the early Downton Abbey series, Edwardian/World War I/early 1920s, which paid off so well for them in the UK and international markets with Julian Fellowes' period upstairs/downstairs soap. The coincidence

that Lord Carnarvon's home of Highclere stood in for Downton Abbey (supposedly in Yorkshire despite most of the accents, upstairs and down, being essentially Home Counties posh and lower orders), is a deliberate audience magnet. All this may still fall short of real audience appeal. Egyptian archaeology involves much sand digging before the great finds come about. Poldark's half naked digging for tin and copper may be no more enthralling, especially as he never finds the metals, but a half naked Aiden Turner is more sexy than a sun protected Max Irons (Jeremy's less talented son).

It is early days, but the writing and direction for Tutankhamun is both laughable and stodgy. Sam Neill is presenting Lord Carnarvon as a bit of a fool and Max Irons is acting Carter as a man who would rather sleep with a mummy than a woman. There is some messing around with time lines for no good dramatic effect. Announcing the nuisance of the outbreak of World War I, interfering with the digging, "some idiot kid just shot the Archduke of Austria", is like a line from Monty Python. Lord Carnarvon's dim seeming daughter Evelyn did not actually arrive in Egypt till after the war.

We have to suffer the failure of finding the tomb of King Tut for another three episodes. Poldark should bury this competitor before they finally, in 1922, uncover the wondrous, unique, tomb. Lord Carnarvon died soon after the find, therefore the future holds little scope for more of the double act with Carter, especially as the myth of the Curse of the Mummy is rubbish. Most of the other individuals involved, including Carter, benefitted from the find and lived happily after. Carter has been acted in numerous versions of the story, as well as turning up in the Indiana Jones movie franchise which involved much tomb robbing. Carter was good at marketing himself and his image but he really was a great Egyptologist which so far Max Irons is not conveying.

We can expect Ross Poldark and his wife Demelza, plus the widow Elizabeth who also loves him, with support from the handsome, but broke doctor Dwight and his beautiful, rich, lover Caroline Penvenen, will keep us away from all the ancient Egyptian sand. More sexy, slow rolling up of stockings on Demelza by Ross should keep us glued to Poldark, at least until they have Prince Albert doing the same favour for Queen Victoria ■

SHORT STORY

Colour. It was beautiful. It was light itself, reflecting to create endless wonders. Finished. The end. When the colour drained, everything was blamed, eyesight, the sun, us. Nothing can bring the colour back now. Now the world is just a spinning hole of darkness. Now the colour has gone forever. Colour was beauty and peace and love. Now it has been lost, wasted on those who didn't appreciate it for what it was.

At first there was havoc. Then a new leader came through. He was cruel, only caring about his money and his comfort. Alistair, king of the world. He was young, and had only been two or three when the colour drained. He did not care why, or how, it was irreversible for all he cared. At first, he thought order could be maintained with a primitive system: Royals dressed in white, the most expensive shade. As you got closer to the dullest of greys, you got closer and closer to the homeless, the poor, the unemployed. There was no point spending money on nice shades that just went grey after being neglected. Soldiers are dark, almost black. They mix with their surroundings, no one sees them creeping around at night. I am a sooty, dusty grey; I go unnoticed in a world of shades.

My mother knew and understood colour. She described it to me as elegant, precious. Timeless. I think the loss of it killed her. She would be truly happy, talking about colour, but would always frown when brought back into the real world, where everything is just a shade of what it once was. She would suddenly become sad and lonely. It pained her to see such beauty lost. It drove her to depression; she simply lost the will, and ability to live.

Living in the streets is hard. No one notices a grey shirt sliding through the crowds staying low to avoid swinging arms and insults. I live off the occasional job, the occasional snatch, giving me enough to survive, no more.

My choice was not a difficult one. I have no family, no friends, and no possessions to treasure. Literally nothing except what is in my head, and that is light enough to carry with me, always. I shall leave this cursed place. I shall run. It shouldn't be hard. No one is stupid enough to try and leave this city. There is no point patrolling into the slums. We are ignored as a general rule.

I know I will have to get over the wall. At first it was tall, like a giant beast watching over us, checking for disobedience. Now signs of age are showing. The top is crumbling with the weather. Vines are starting to creep up. I believe I can scale it. I get there in the very early morning, before the sun had risen, when the wall was in shadow. From the bottom I can see cracks and juts, allowing for hand and footholds to carry me up.

Placing a foot in a small crack and my hands in a higher one, I accepted the rough, gritty feel beneath my fingers and began to pull myself up. I felt my back and arms quivering, anticipating a bullet in my back. I was extremely surprised to find my fingers hooking over the edge of the wall. I used the last of my strength to pull myself up and lie down looking at the sky on the top of the wall. Feeling the sharp, spiky stones sticking into my back, I wriggled into a decent position and began to descend back down the wall.

Reaching the bottom, I collapsed. Lying on the parched ground, I swept my arms and legs around making arches on the ground. Finally, I decided to get up, and head away from the city that is no longer my prison. I bounced lightly up and down on my toes until I felt the burning in my arms and legs lessen slightly. Then I set off.

Running felt so good. Just listening to the constant drum beat of my feet pounding away on the dry earth. I was free. I was happy. I was alone. I was uncontrolled. I was... thirsty. I began to notice how dry my mouth was, how desperate for water I had become. I needed to find water; I couldn't bear the thought of heading back.

I looked around, and with some sense of relief, I noticed a speck of dark on the pale ground. I slowly half jogged towards it and it began to take shape. A box. A black box. Stepping up to it, I cautiously picked it up. It made a sloshing sound, like water being shaken around. I pulled up the lid and stuck two fingers in. It felt like water, and my fingers weren't burning off so I gently licked some of the water off my fingers. It was water!

As I was about to stick my fingers back in, I noticed something different. My fingers, a pale grey with dust and mud looked different. Colourful. I screamed and stepped back, almost dropping the box and splashing water everywhere. Where it hit the ground splotches of beauty spread out, and the box wasn't getting any emptier. I experimentally poured some on my foot. My shoe became bright- wonderful, and the box definitely wasn't emptying.

My thirst forgotten, I swung the box around and watched colour sprout around me. But as I watched the earth, I could see the colour shrinking, coming towards... me. It came up my legs, a silvery feeling until my whole body was ablaze with it. Everything but me was grey. I touched my fingers to the earth and as I watched colour spread outwards, I knew what I had to do.

Perfect Choice is just what it says... a perfect choice for a rainy weekend curled up on the sofa, or a great little read as you lie by the pool on your much loved sun bed!



Whatever the circumstances, you will come away from this book with a greater understanding of life's many questions. Through the characters of Jeff and Diana, the author, Mary Ancillette, explores the dynamics of relationships in depth along with the complexities of how we communicate our spiritual aspects.

All change for winter is near

As the leaves fall in ever increasing numbers and the winds have their day giving us the run around, it's time to protect our wildlife and gardens with vigour even if only to keep warm as we go .

Top Tips

- Clear up fallen leaves - especially from lawns, ponds and beds
- Raise containers onto pot feet to prevent waterlogging
- Plant tulip bulbs for a spring display next year
- Prune roses to prevent wind-rock
- Plant out winter bedding
- Cover brassicas with netting if pigeons are a problem
- Insulate outdoor containers from frost - bubblewrap works well
- Stop winter moth damage to fruit trees using grease bands around the trunks
- Put out bird food to encourage winter birds into the garden
- Use a seasonal bonfire - where this is allowed - to dispose of excess debris unfit for composting

Rotary Crocus Planting for Polio in Cranleigh



For over 30 years, Rotary International and its members have been committed to fighting to eradicate polio across the world, and now the number of polio endemic countries has dropped from 125 to just two, with over 2.5 billion children receiving vaccinations, thanks to the help of Rotary. Disappointingly, however, a few cases were recently found in Nigeria, so there can be no let up on the eradication programme.



Rotary International's latest campaign, Purple4Polio, in partnership with the Royal Horticultural Society, has now sold in excess of 6 million purple crocus corms (Ruby Giant) for planting across Great Britain and Ireland this autumn. This is intended to encourage communities to engage in an activity that forms part of the final push to eradicate polio for good.

Cranleigh Rotary, supported by Cranleigh Chamber of Commerce and Cranleigh in Bloom, are participating in this latest national Rotary campaign. We plan to play our small part on 12th November by planting 5,000 crocus corms near the pond on The Common, with kind permission of Waverley Borough Council (see aerial photo below).

If you would like to help for an hour or two, we will be most pleased to see you. Children will be able to join in by



helping us count the bulbs, which will be planted in a series of small batches. It is our intention to plant the bulbs in a circular formation, about 10 metres across, that reflects the Rotary "wheel" symbol, thus creating an iconic feature each spring on our wonderful Common.

The campaign to rid the world of polio is Rotary International Foundation's Centenary Project. It is one of hundreds of other health and community projects undertaken by Rotary in Great Britain and Ireland, as well as overseas.

The climax of the week was a Gala Evening, which was organised by the students, who also provided excellent musical entertainment and hosted the evening themselves. Past Rotary President Michael Hart attended the final Gala Evening and awards ceremony on the Friday night, along with their parents.

Romanian Children Annual Christmas Shoebox Appeal

This year, as for several years now, St. Nicolas Church and Cranleigh Rotary are jointly organising a 'shoebox appeal' in Cranleigh and surrounding villages so as to enhance Christmas for deprived and disabled children in Romania. The aim is to fill shoeboxes with clothes or toys, for example, for girls and boys in three age ranges between about four and sixteen; these shoeboxes might, for some children, represent the only Christmas gift they receive. As before, the request is aimed at both the people of Cranleigh and local schools where the children, in choosing the gift items, become directly involved in this most humanitarian appeal.



The event is part of a nationwide effort, extending from Poole to Dundee, whereby a series of long-established UK-based supporters organise the collection of gift-filled boxes and their subsequent transport to a Christian centre in Hunedoara, western Romania. The centre was set up by Corneliu and Diana Medrea in 1999 and, as well as conducting Christian activities, the centre also seeks to develop practical projects to meet the dire physical and material needs of those around them. With the aid they have received, they have created not only a community social care centre, but have also provided showers and washing facilities for children whose families have no running water or electricity. In addition, there is a daily-meals programme for children who have little or no food and they also operate after-school clubs to support the educational needs of illiterate children.

Many may recall that the original shoebox appeal efforts in Cranleigh were organised by Task Force Romania (TfR). This was a Christian-inspired national charity that effectively started after Anneka Rice visited post-Ceausescu Romania in 1989 and, on her return to the UK, the BBC screened the appalling scenes in orphanages that she had witnessed. There was a gross lack of suitable care and food, and abominable hygiene conditions. The roots of TfR can actually be traced to the Surrey Probation Service in 1990 through the inspiration of a Christian Probation Officer, Peter Spring, who as a member of Cranleigh's St. Nicolas Parish Church led a team of young men across six countries with medical supplies and, in particular, toys and clothing for children. In those early days the various task forces of volunteers also carried out significant practical work in refurbishing a crumbling 100-bed children's hospital.



In aggregate, it is estimated that in excess of 7,000 boxes have been donated by the Cranleigh and local communities over the past 11 years, and both the general public and the schools involved deserve great credit for their consistently high levels

of generosity. Indeed, this year the number of local schools who plan to participate has increased from five, just a few years ago, to more than 10.

In Cranleigh, the collected shoeboxes are stored temporarily alongside boxes transported here from several other UK towns which, over the years, are reckoned to have amounted to about 50,000 boxes. All boxes are then sorted (according to gender and age) by Cranleigh volunteers before being packed into a major truck which then departs directly for Romania. This overall exercise requires considerable coordination not least to reduce the significant costs associated with transport to and distribution within Romania, and in that particular respect each shoebox donor is also asked to contribute £2.



Countless volunteers from, in particular, St. Nicolas and Cranleigh Rotary have been involved in this benevolent exercise since 2005, and the stalwart organisers over most of that period have included Ruth Collins, Michael Wild, Jon Horrocks, Andrew Kolmar, and Tom Cornwell, with Nic Vrijland invariably providing suitable temporary use of warehouse space for storage and sorting.

The deadline for contributing a shoebox of gifts this year is 14 November 2016 and boxes can be deposited at either St. Nicolas Church or at Celebration Cakes in Cranleigh's High Street (courtesy of Tom Cornwell, a long-standing Rotarian). School boxes will be collected en masse by Rotary volunteers from the participating schools and then all boxes will be suitably segregated into gender/age packs before being loaded onto a truck bound for Romania later that week. ■







Remember that meal

Sometimes, just the smell of food can take you back . . .
in time and place.



November is traditionally the month for remembering the lost family members, friends and those who died in various conflicts. For this recipe I have chosen to remember, Venice and the food I have eaten there for the first time. The recipes below make enough for a three course dinner for four guests.

1 CARPACCIO DI BUE

(Ox Carpaccio)

Carpaccio is an Italian hors d'oeuvre consisting of thin slices of raw beef or fish served with a sauce.

Since this dish is served raw, the meat must be fresh

Serves Four People

Ingredients

4x 12g fillet steak (no sinews and no fat)

80 ml olive oil

40g capers

Juice of 2 lemons

10 ml balsamic Vinegar

Salt and pepper (from the mill)

4 Parsley florets or whichever you'd like to decorate with

Preparation

1. Wrap the steak in plastic wrap and place in the fridge for two hours.
2. Then unwrap and slice the steak thinly into 1/8 to 1/4 inch pieces.
3. Place each fillet steak in between two plastic sheets.
4. With a meat mallet or a rolling pin, gently pound the meat until paper thin.
5. Divide the meat equally between four chilled dinner plates.
6. Sprinkle the oil, lemon juice, and vinegar onto it, and serve with the parsley florets.
7. Serve with warm crusty rolls.



2 FEGATO ALLA VENEZIANA

(Venetian Liver)

Serves Four People

Ingredients

600g liver - either veal or lamb
 100g onion, finely sliced
 60g roughly chopped parsley
 150 ml dry white wine
 60 ml olive oil
 Salt and pepper (from the mill)

300 ml strong chicken stock
 Sufficient oil for sealing the meat and vegetables
 Some Bisto thickening granules
 Seasoning and chopped parsley

Preparation

1. Slice the liver into equal strips.
2. Place the strips into a bowl with a good helping of pepper and leave for at least 2 hours.
3. In a wok or large frying pan, heat the oil.
4. When the oil is really very hot, add the onions.
5. Fry until the onions begin to colour.
6. Then add the liver, stirring all the time until the meat begins to stiffen.
7. Keeping the heat up high, add the wine and salt.
8. When the wine has almost evaporated, turn off the heat and place the lot in a warm dish before sprinkling parsley over and serving.

A chicory salad is usually served with this meal, and a good white farmhouse bread. Soave is the ideal wine to pair with this dish.



3 CONO GELATO CON MORE

("Ice cream with more")

Serves Four People

Ingredients

4 round wafers or sponge biscuits
 8 balls of vanilla ice cream
 250g fresh or frozen blackberries
 Juice of half lemon
 100g icing sugar



Preparation

Serve two ice cream balls per person

1. Place two icecream balls, one on top of the other, to form a cone.
2. Repeat with the rest before placing them in the freezer.
3. Divide the blackberries in two lots: one to go into a bowl for later, and the other to place on the cones.
4. Working on one cone at the time, stud them with blackberries from one bowl and immediately return them to the freezer.
5. Take the blackberries from the second bowl and add the icing sugar and lemon juice before liquidising until you have made a syrupy liquid which will be poured over the cones when serving.

P.S. The above recipes I sampled in Venice in the past. The Liver, possibly in 1939, the ice cream in the 50s, and the Carpaccio in the 90s.

I cannot be sure they were identical to the recipes I tasted because my memory plays tricks at times! But the above is what I served to customers and friends.



Cranleigh Film Club

Review of Embrace of the Serpent.

Cranleigh Film Club will be showing a truly unique film in the Bandroom on Thursday 24 November. **Embrace of the Serpent** is a breath taking odyssey through the heart of the Columbian Amazon at two different times in the first half of the 20th century. It details the quest of two European explorers, one in 1909 and the other in the 1940s, both in search of a flower alleged to have healing properties. These two men are based on real life individuals, the earlier one is the German ethnologist Theodor Koch-Grunberg, called Theo in the film, and the later one is the American psychedelic researcher and botanist Richard Evans Schultze, here named Evan. The connecting link between the two eras is the character of Karamakate, the same native shaman who guided both expeditions. He is the last of the Cohiuano tribe and is played by a young actor, Nilbio Torres for the earlier expedition and as an older man, by Antonio Bolivar.

Columbian writer-director **Ciro Guerra** has been hugely influenced by the German director **Werner Herzog**, the spirit of whose films **Aguirre, the Wrath of God** and **Fitzcarraldo**, loom over this one. **Guerra** has a good ear for the self justifying and delusional ventures of both men, but also how they charmed the natives into helping them. Nevertheless he also shows the colonialist exploitation the natives suffered, the patronising and condescension, and their materialism and vanity. There are moments of historically valid violence and terror. The film's concept of parallel stories linked by a "noble savage" would be too obvious were it not for the poignancy of the older **Karamakate's** loneliness now he has lost his culture.

The crisp black and white photography captures the extraordinary landscapes with haunting almost mythical sense of wonder, whilst the balance between documentary realism and dreamlike mysticism makes for a truly poetic cinematic experience.


