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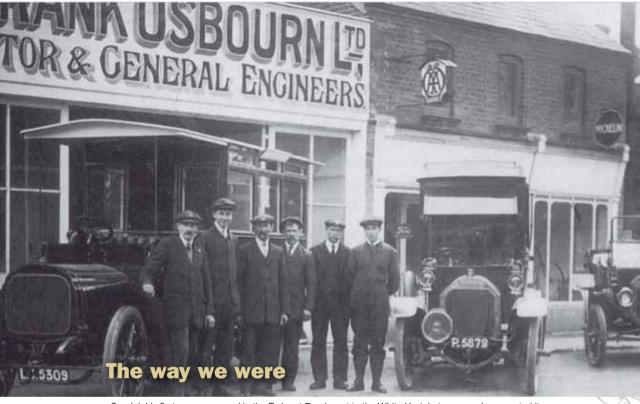
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Joy of Cranleigh Joy Horn brings some anecdotes of 100 years ago

What was happening in Cranleigh in November 1917?



Cranleigh's first garage opened in the Ewhurst Road, next to the White Hart, but as car sales mounted it moved to larger premises next to the Three Horseshoes

hree incidents from November 1917 highlight how life has changed in the past century.

At the Guildford County Bench on November 16th, Arthur William Upson of Cranleigh was summoned for having used petrol for an unauthorised purpose, and his employer, Mrs R. Thorpe, was also summoned for permitting this. Their crime? PC Sawyer reported having seen Upson driving two ladies to St Nicolas church, Cranleigh, just before 11.00am on November 4th. Upson had driven them here from Shamley Green. In his defence, Upson said, 'I thought I could bring them to church'. Mrs Thorpe said of the two ladies, 'They rang up and asked if I could take them, so I let the car go.' Both Upson and Mrs Thorpe were dismissed with a caution, the chairman telling Upson he must not take people to church by car in wartime.

Cromwell Coffee House-Homemade Food

Another court case involved an unnamed 13-yearold Shamley Green boy, whose father was away serving in France. After school hours, he was employed as a delivery boy, and, having received 4s 4d from a customer, failed to give it to his employer. He was sentenced to receive '6 strokes with the birch' for embezzlement. This would have been administered privately by a policeman, on the boy's bare buttocks, usually immediately after the magistrate's sentence, either in a room at the court or at a nearby police station. Birching was used a judicial punishment for boys under 14, especially for petty theft. It was abolished in 1948.

An announcement in the Surrey Advertiser may have occasioned shock and horror here: 'The Dairymen of Cranleigh beg to inform the inhabitants that on and after Monday November 12th 1917, there will be only one delivery of Milk daily during the winter months.' [Signed] E. Mann of Vine Farm Dairy, G. Weller of Park House Dairy, H. Worsfold of New

On November 28th, a concert was put on at the Oaklands Red Cross Hospital, and the Quartermaster, Hester Godfrey, persuaded several of the performers to sign her programme, and then stuck it into her scrapbook as a memento. The performers were a mix of soldier-patients and staff. Nurse Betty Chadwyck-Healey, who sang 'The Gipsy Trail', was the

daughter of Charles Chadwyck-Healey of Wyphurst (now St Joseph's School in Amlett's Lane). The violinist Margaret Fortune came from New House Farm. She was a volunteer who 'did house and parlour work regularly twice a week', clocking up 1,500 hours before the war ended. Mrs Marie Lee, who contributed a recitation, was an unpaid cook.

Far away from these relatively insignificant happenings in Cranleigh, the 3rd Battle of Ypres came to an end at last on November 10th, when the Canadian Corps took the ruined village of Passchendaele. The casualties during the three-month battle were

enormous, and included four Cranleigh men killed. Far away in Petrograd (St Petersburg), the Bolsheviks had taken over the government of Russia, in an almost bloodless coup. One of Lenin's first acts was to issue a unilateral Russian Decree of Peace. Russia had withdrawn from the war, and there would be huge repercussions.

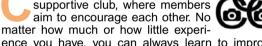

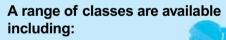

Eleanore Duggan

Lost and found

Eleanore Duggan Singer Songwriter

leanore is a Cranleigh singer-songwriter who describes her style as 'symphonic rock'. She performs with her band 'Eleanore & the Lost', as well as composing & singing on independent projects. Over the past year, she has been gigging in the South of England to promote her second album "The Gift".

Tell us a bit about your background

We moved here to Cranleigh when I was 14. I loved the switch to the countryside, and since moving, I haven't wanted to go back to live in any towns or cities - I've completely become a 'country girl'. I love that village feel when you know people you walk by on the street.

I was actually born in London, but we moved down to Guildford when I was 2 years old. Both my parents were classically trained professional singers, however, I never felt pushed into music at all. Growing up I also had a passion for ceramic art, and Biology- which I became interested in due to my love of animals.

When I was 11 and in the state school system, I told my mum that I wanted to go to Guildford High School (an independent school). She was a bit dubious at first, having been a teacher in state schools, but I sat the entrance exam and got in on an assisted place. It was a bit surreal at times as there were girls going to Gstaad just for the weekend! However it turned out to be a really good change for me as the school had so many resources available. In my A-level music technology course, for example, there were just two of us in the class and two teachers - we had a lot of time devoted to us.

Why music?

It must be in my DNA to some extent! Like anything creative, it's something I can't not do so it's an essential part of who I am. If I don't sing or create music then it feels like something is wrong or missing from my life. There's always music in my head waiting to get out. I think I recorded my first songs on cassette tapes when I was around 10 years old – but I hid them and wouldn't let anyone see them!

What influence have your parents had on you?

My mum played all kinds of music whilst I was growing up, which was lovely because when I went to school I knew the recent hits as well as artists from decades past that my peers had never heard of. I would also sometimes go to see my dad sing at the English National Opera where he was employed as a tenor.

As both my parents were singers, it also meant that I had valuable insight into the reality of the music world – including the unglamorous bits and the hard work.





When we moved to Cranleigh, my mum started teaching singing, running courses and putting on shows at Cranleigh Arts Centre. Getting involved in that was one of the best experiences of my life as I was a part of so many aspects, such as providing backing vocals for student soloists, being in group musical numbers, arranging and recording music, and choreography. I learned to sing in every genre and learned how to work with an audience. It was massively educational for me.

What's your process like?

I use piano to compose songs – I did some piano grades alongside my classical singing grades, but I still wouldn't use one to accompany myself live! I also use a music software program to form my ideas, by playing every instrument used in the songs I come up with.

I've written in lots of different ways and I try to write about a variety of subjects. When I'm thinking about new songs, I naturally envision melody and lyrics together, with instrumentation sometimes too. It's a mysterious process! I never get rid of any musical ideas I have. One of my most recently released songs "What Goes Around" was just a verse and a piano line for years and I couldn't visualise the rest of it, until one day it came to me whilst driving - now it's one of my favourite songs to perform live.

What are the toughest obstacles you've faced?

Finances have been the toughest, however, when I went to university to do a music composition course, it ended up being a difficult period too. I had corrective surgery near the beginning of my first year to correct some bone overgrowth which caused asymmetry in my face. We had been preparing for it for years, but there was a long recovery time and it made my time at uni a lot harder. Just before the first operation, I was told I would look 'extremely different' afterwards - so I was terrified! When it was all over though, I could see it had just helped me to look like me again.

My music is constantly taking money, however, I'm lucky to have relationships with people I trust and who are really good to me - such as my producer, the guy who masters my music and the band I work with now. On top of paying to have my music produced and paying the band members, I also have to raise funds for lots of additional costs that perhaps aren't things you'd be aware of, such as pressing CDs and paying for prints of posters.

I've also suffered from depression, which started after my first maxillo-facial surgery and was later triggered through events such as the death of my grandmother and the breakup of a relationship around that time. I think it's something that lots of musicians experience, as it tends to be a career of 'highs and lows'. When I'm performing or signing CDs for example, it's a real high having all these people saying nice things, whereas other aspects of my work can be very solitary and there's a lot of stress involved with worrying about how I'm going to pay for it all. I do earn royalties from my music, but these days a lot of people just stream music and most monies are earned from selling merchandise at live gigs and getting music placed in film/TV etc.

What have been some of the best moments?

One of the best moments for me was when I was commissioned to create 'asmākam – the quest' which was a four part orchestral dance piece for an Indian dance company (SB Dance). It was a different genre from my usual music which I class as 'symphonic rock' and it made me realise I was capable of more than I thought. We also eventually did a run at the Edinburgh Fringe with it, which was a wonderful experience.

My first album "Parlour Game" had really positive feedback and reviews, and I was offered some prestigious gigs off the back of that such as one for the Windsor Festival where they actually designed a

contemporary dance show around the songs on my album. Creating music and putting it out there has really helped me develop my own distinctive sound, as well as helping me to "find" my fanbase. Finding out what I have in common with my fans has also been really fun as we tend to like lots of the same things —so they're very easy to connect with. My songs have also been used in a few films, which I've been offered 'cameo' roles in. One time I was asked to write a 'fairy lullaby' for one of these films and then appear as a fairy singing it!

On my second album, one of the songs 'My True Nature' was originally commissioned by the Worldwide Fund for Nature (WWF-UK) as the theme song for their 50th anniversary and also as the stimulus piece for a creative competition for 9-16 year olds around the UK. It was a song about the natural world to get children involved in creating their own musical pieces and artwork for submission.

'Eleanore & the Lost'-why that name?

On my first album, it simply said 'Eleanore' and when I got the band together I wanted to include them a bit more with the name – also it's difficult for people to find me under just 'Eleanore' on Google!

I wanted something a bit mysterious sounding and I thought of that 80s comedy/horror vampire film 'The Lost Boys'— I didn't want to cash in on the name so I went for 'Eleanore & the Lost' which sounds a bit darker, I think . My fans seem to like it and they've even started calling themselves 'Losties' on my band Facebook page!

Who's been a role model for you?

Musically, I always cite a few people. My producer introduced me to Jeff Buckley's music when I was around 14. I love his work, you take away the instrumentation and you've almost got a poem there. His music has been key in helping me develop my lyrics and inspiring me to work harder on making them more beautiful. There are also songs on my first album when I was into 'rockier' music and bands like Evanescence were my inspiration – I was really into the gothic, long dark haired look then!

There are other artists like Kate Bush and Bjork who can be quite hard to access and understand, but I admire their strength of character and the way they're not afraid to experiment and be who they are — which is what I think music is really all about.

I'd also say that my mum has been a role model. Whenever I get really low and start wondering "is this

My second album has been released in three parts (Parts I and II are already available online) with Part III due for release next year. My fans have also started asking for a CD so I'll be making that, along with a special edition CD I have plans for.

I got a new band together last year for the album promotion and I've really been enjoying performing with them since then. One of our gigs was at the Arts Centre which is where I debuted my first album. We were able to play our older songs along with the new ones, so you could hear how we'd evolved over the 6-7 years.

We also recently performed at The Brighton Centre in October, which is a 4.5 thousand seater arena - I was almost swamped when I came offstage, which was amazing! I've now been asked to contribute to the festival CD and there are other offers in the works as a result, which is really exciting.

What would you say to anyone wanting to go down the same route?

I've realised that as the music industry has changed, I've had to become more than just a musician - I've had to become a whole business too. I've completed courses in online music promotion for different social media platforms and I want to do some further graphic design training because I design my merchandise and posters myself. I also do all the promoting, the costumes, the hair and makeup, the admin, and so on. You have to take on everything!

The Musicians' Union say that you can expect to be spending half your time actually running the business - and it's true! However, you do lose all that control if you are signed, so I'd say prepare for a great number of "jobs" if you choose to be an independent artist, but also appreciate how much power you retain at the same time.

It's easy to consider becoming a world famous celebrity as having reached the ultimate, but the reality is that for lots of artists, they've achieved success when they're free to creatively express themselves without limitations.

And if you could give one last piece of advice?

Obviously there are lots of things you should take into consideration, and I would probably say it is going to be tricky, but if this is really something that you want to do then don't give up, because nothing will happen if you do that. Don't give up because you've got all that potential ahead of you.

Have you got anything new coming up?

that my music has helped them with their thesis at

university, or that it's actually helped them through

chemotherapy - which is quite humbling.

I feel like I'm in a really good place these days because with my second album I know who I'm aiming my music at and the sound I want to create with it, which has helped me plan how I present myself to my fanbase online and also onstage.

Hammering the Hammers

s more and more developers move in to Cranleigh to erect homes for thousands of newcomers let us spare a thought for the fate of some of our long-established residents.

England's 'largest village' is changing fast and surely will not be able to celebrate that tag for much longer.

Every field currently seems to be fair game for a planning application. And once a development gets approved then this appears to only create appetite to try and fit in even more.

We're taking a hammering and so is one of our more scarce and beautiful birds. The Yellowham-

A lot have been forced to move out already – and they won't be coming back. The fields and hedgerows where they once fed and bred are going, going - and in a number of areas have already gone.

The Yellowhammer, a cheery countryside bird, is a little longer than a House Sparrow. It sings its distinctive song from the top of a tree, bush or hedge. As many people have remarked, use a bit of imagination around its eight-note song and you might hear: 'A-little-bit-of-bread-and-no-cheese.'

Males have a fierce yellow head and underparts, with a reddish brown 'waistcoat' and rump, and

brown and black streaked upperparts. When flying away it often gives a short 'click' call. The females, like many in the bird world, are much drabber. And that's a smart move because they don't want to attract a predator while sitting on their eggs.

I vividly recall seeing my first one when I was only just four years old. I remember thinking how beautiful it was. I had never seen one before and the moment was all the more poignant because I don't think I'd previously seen death either.

This little chap had been killed by a cat and I was struck by how it was retaining its dazzling yellow splendour while being so lifeless. I could not fathom how such an amazing creature could possibly be dead. It made me very sad.

Today I'm sad for the fate of the Yellowhammer on a wider scale. It is on the official Red List as a species of greatest conservation concern. Assessment criteria for this includes historical decline, trends in population and range, localised distribution and international importance.

Around Cranleigh and surrounding villages it was once a widespread and common resident breeder. I used to see as many as 50 together. Back in 1989 one of Surrey's biggest ever counts was made in Ewhurst when there was an exceptional flock of 200 in a field unusually left as stubble.

Most of these would have been winter visitors. They brought with them a rarity that breeds from the Urals to Siberia and China, a Pine Bunting – Surrey's only record and the first seen in an inland county of Britain.

But the local, county and national population was already in trouble and by 1998 the Yellowhammer stopped breeding in the Surrey Hills at Winterfold Heath. That looked ominous and so it proved. This century it became far harder to find around the village.

Counts of 20 or more in Surrey are now exceptional and here a pre-breeding season flock of even 10 would be highly notable.

Thankfully it is still possible to see the Yellowhammer around Cranleigh but it is much sparser and a couple of pairs on a two hour walk is a good return. At least five of this bird's previously favoured areas are now either occupied by homes or are muddy development sites.

The loss of so many working farms has undoubtedly contributed to the Yellowhammer's decline. Changes in the way we farm, such as autumn sowing, means stubble fields are rare now so the bird has to go elsewhere for food.

But where the Yellowhammer does hang on, as it does here, it would be good to do what we can to encourage it.

Humans obviously need somewhere to live – and so does the Yellowhammer. What is needed is a balanced, conservation-minded approach that allows both to have a home. 'No-cheese' need not mean 'no choice'.

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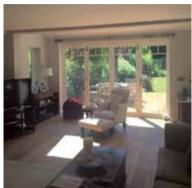

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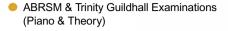

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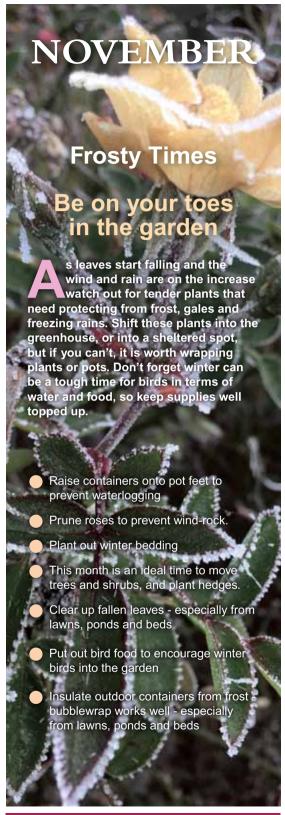
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he Adult Master's Swimming Club has been running for almost 35 years at Cranleigh Leisure swimming pool. It was organised and run initially by Waverley Borough Council employing their own instructors to set routines and teach the classes every Tuesday and Thursday to what are now able swimmers; it is now run privately.

Originally the first group began swimming widths to build up performance. Times moved on considerably and the level of swimmers ability has grown enormously. There are however several of the starting group from the Eighties still attending.

Predominately, the age group coming regularly are 30's/40's (mums having dropped the children off to school) up to 50's/60's made up of more experienced long term swimmers, still trying to keep fit with a sport they have grown up with, and often with degrees of competition successes behind them.

A good proportion of the recent crop of swimmers are training for Triathlon events, swimming often being the one event of the three that requires more determined training to give speed and stamina for the event.

The timing for the training session is 9.00 through to 10.00 in the morning, every Tuesday and Thursday all year round with the whole pool privately hired by the club exclusively; consequently no requirement to pay on entry if attending the Adult Masters class.

Sarah Perry is the coach on pool-side who sets the routine on Tuesday's for all to follow and instructs with specific themes as a total class on Thursday's. She will at all times be picking up on specific faults with all swimmers so as to improve and refine their performance. Sarah is paid by the club privately and has been on our case for nearly ten years. Obviously she is very good at pushing all to higher and higher standards.

The club attendance is always between ten and twenty for each class, even though club members number nearly fifty names. Fortunately, not everyone comes on the same day. Consequently there are a regular 2-4 swimmers per lane, each graded according to their speed and ability, from slow to medium to fast lane.

The cost of membership is £35.00 and each class has a single charge of £6.00. Most people pay lump sums for a three month term at £60.00 for once a week (13 swims) or £100 for twice a week (26 swims).

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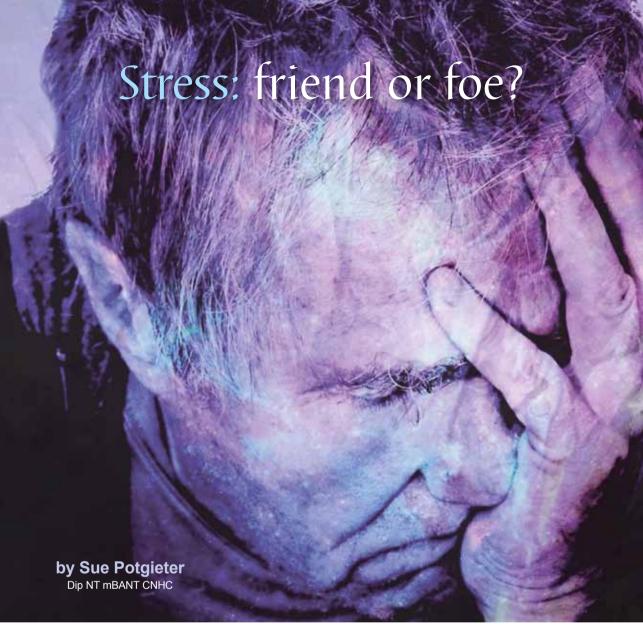
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ver the last few months we have looked at the core imbalances in disease from a functional medicine point of view; this month we review the last one. Stress - is it a friend or a foe?

As hunter-gatherers in the past, stress played a vital role in our survival, alerting us to the presence of a sabre-tooth tiger, and enabling us to escape! It served a purpose by ramping up certain body systems and temporarily lowering others, so that we could deal with the threat. Afterwards the body would return to normal, until maybe a marauding bear wandered into the camp, and the whole cycle would start again.

In today's society, rather than dealing with an occasional sabre-tooth tiger or bear, we find ourselves under constant attack. Running late for work, financial pressures, relationship issues, chronic sleep deprivation, bereavement, work deadlines, over exercising, inflammatory foods such as sugar and trans fats, being constantly available via email

or phone: the body perceives these as stressors and goes into what is known as 'fight or flight' mode. Unfortunately, these days we rarely get the chance to move out of this state into what is known as 'rest and digest' mode, because as soon as one stress passes, the next one is close on its heels.

Although the concept of stress has earned a bad reputation, it is important to recognise that while long-term stress is generally harmful, short-term stress can be protective as it prepares the body to deal with challenges. It up-regulates the immune system promoting wound healing, and enables the body to deal more efficiently with pathogenic bacteria. Long term stress, however, suppresses many of the body's systems, leading to low grade chronic inflammation and may increase susceptibility to some of what life insurance companies term as 'dread diseases'. Have you ever found it harder to throw off a cold when you're stressed?

In the presence of a stressor, the adrenal glands (little

triangular organs situated on top of each kidney) release hormones including adrenaline and cortisol. These cause an increased blood flow to the muscles, heart and brain to support the 'fight or flight' response. Digestive and reproductive processes are inhibited during this time. Research has shown that repeated and uncontrollable stress can dysregulate cortisol levels, promoting fat around the middle and a tendency to crave high fat, high sugar or high salt

Do you ever reach for a doughnut, or chocolate or crisps when you're stressed? Find it hard to lose weight? Could it be that there is a biochemical imbalance in the body from being chronically stressed, which needs addressing, and it's not just a lack of willpower? Research is beginning to show a clear correlation between high cortisol and high insulin levels, and fat around the middle. High cortisol levels can also suppress the appetite in some people, leading to weight loss.

Sleep deprivation is a common chronic stressor and two recent meta-analyses have found that short sleep duration (<5h per night for adults, <10h per night for children) significantly predicted obesity. As further demands are placed on us each day, we have to discover a way to relieve our chronic stress levels in order to optimise our health.

Reduce and Manage Stress

- Meditation or mindfulness: This practice has been shown to help train the brain and body to turn off the stress response and promote more relaxation. Check out the app Headspace for a great way to get started.
 Deep breathing exercises: Taking deep breaths helps turn down the sympathetic nervous system (fight or flight mode) and kick in the body's natural relaxation response by activating the parasympathetic nervous system (rest and digest mode).
- 3. Spending time in nature/outdoors: walk in the forest, do some gardening but get outside and away from technology to allow yourself to relax.

Stress relieving foods

- 1. Sunflower seeds, wild salmon, avocados, broccoli, mushrooms, eggs, some grass fed meat for B vitamins
- 2. Increase your intake of vegetables and fruit to 8-10 portions (1 portion = fistful) a day for vitamin C (high intake required during stressful times)

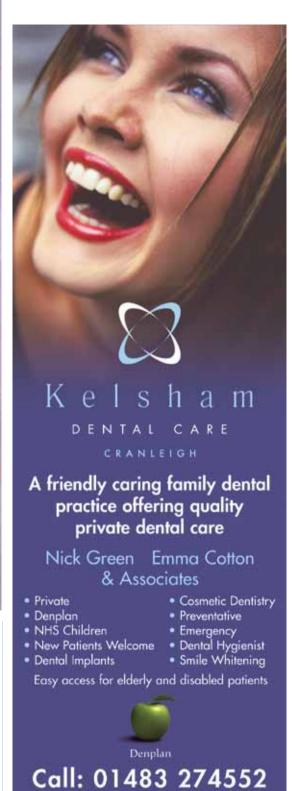

Imodovar returns to female focused drama which he has specialised in throughout his colourful career. This new work has been praised as a recapture of the famous style and content of his much loved earlier works. It appears that basing the new work on Alice Munro short stories has provided a strong framework for this generational exploration of estrangement, guilt and reconciliation. We all remember his success with All About My Mother, an arthouse favourite for the last twenty years. The new work could be called "all about my daughter" because the central dynamic involves the writing of an account by the mother in middle age to try to explain to a daughter she has not seen in yeas what happened.

Julieta is played by two fine actresses, the newcomer Adriana Urgarte as the 20 something version ready for first real love, and Emma Suarez as the older version 30 years on. There are three Alomodovar drives his work via flashbacks which gradually reveal the source of guilt and the motivation for flight from reality. We first meet Julieta in middle age, about to depart with her new partner to Portugal. A chance meeting with a friend of her estranged daughter sets in motion her quest to explain her own behaviour and these memories form the film. Julieta is shown to be emotionally complex but the key transition comes quite early when the daughter is drying the younger Julieta's hair and older version emerges.

The film has many gorgeous moments, supremely well photographed and there is a perfect musical a score by Alberto Iglesias which gathers many motifs into a melodic jazz plus classical score, depending on the mood required. An unexpected death early in the story has a permanent effect on Julieta and is counter pointed by a much more serious one later. Julieta's own mother is an invalid and her father is betraying her with a nurse and Julieta cannot but link this to her own relationship, and her daughter's estrangement is traceable to Julieta's treatment of her own father. This all appears complex but Almodovar makes it an easy, beautiful family saga to follow with relish. This is a true cinematic joy.

Friends and

ovember is often a month for remembering lost friends, but also the happy times we enjoyed with them.

Friends pop up from all sorts of places – whether you make them at school when you're growing up, you find an unexpected acquaintance at your first job, or you've experienced a friendship that blossomed from a chance encounter and grew into something valuable and long-lasting.

Through a number of circumstances, you may one day realise that these friends are no longer with you. Sometimes just one of those things, a memory of a lost friend can leave you feeling mixed emotions. I choose to remember the happy mealtimes I had with some of my closest companions, with this recipe for a three course meal that we all enjoyed sharing together.



ZUPPA DI FAGIOLI E ZUCCA (Borlotti Bean Soup)

If there is any cooked bacon or ham to use up, it can be chopped and added to the pan

Ingredients

300g dry borlotti beans, soaked overnight 500g skinless pumpkin, roughly cut 60g of ham fat 20ml olive oil 1 onion, finely sliced



6 cloves of garlic, peeled and crushed 25g ground ginger

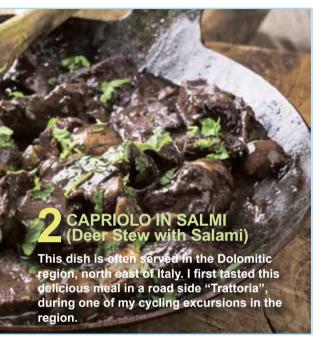
30g fresh sage and rosemary, finely chopped 700ml strong chicken stock (put aside 100ml) Salt and pepper corn from a mill

Preparation

- 1. Boil the borlotti beans in the stock for 1 ½ hours
- 2. Boil the pumpkin in salted water until soft, then drain and keep warm
- 3. Heat the oil and fat together and use to fry the onions and garlic until they colour
- 4. Add the pumpkin along with some of the stock, stirring all the time, until bubbling
- 5. Add the cooked borlotti, the pumpkin, and the ground ginger
- 6. If the soup is too thick, add some additional stock
- 7. Correct the seasoning
- 8. Serve with crusty rolls

Ettore's mother sometimes used to "pass the soup through a mouli". Today, you can easily liquidise for a smoother texture. I personally prefer the chunkier version.

Food



* A trattoria is an Italian-style eating establishment, less formal than a ristorante. There are generally no printed menus, the service is kept casual, and wine is sold by the decanter rather than the bottle.

Ingredients

700g shoulder venison, cut into largish cubes & marinated overnight (see method below) 100g fat pancetta, chopped into small pieces 50ml olive oil

2 celery sticks, chopped

1 large onion, chopped

8 cloves of garlic, peeled and crushed

10g mixed spices

30g mixed herbs (sage, rosemary, basil, mint, thyme, & parsley)

Salt and pepper corn from a mill

An item to thicken – my personal preference is bisto granules

THE MARINADE • 300ml strong beef stock

- 500ml red wine Half the celery, onion & garlic
- Herbs and spices as per above

Preparation

- 1. Place the meat in a large bowl.
- 2. Pour in the marinade and leave it covered over

night to steep

- On the following day, heat half the oil in a nonstick pan until hot before adding the pancetta
- 4. When it starts to colour, add the remainder of the onions, garlic, and celery
- 5. Set aside once cooked
- 6. On a separate non-stick pan, heat the remainder of the oil
- 7. Once hot, add the drained venison pieces, stir ring all the time until there is no blood showing
- 8. Take the pan with the onions, garlic, celery that you set aside earlier and add to the venison
- Stirring until well heated before adding the marinade and adjusting the seasoning
- 11. Simmer for 1 ½ hours then thicken to taste
- 12. Serve in a suitable dish with croutons and roughly chopped parsley sprinkled over
- 13. Creamed potatoes and broccoli are a must



Chestnuts are plenty in November in North East Italy. There once was an owner of a Trattoria I knew, who served this beautiful dish for dessert. I have tried to recreate it but I have never been able to get it to taste as it did 60 odd years ago.

Ingredients

200g of chestnuts, peeled 100g caster sugar 150g ricotta 60g dark chocolate, melted 50ml maraschino Double cream, whisked Cocoa powder to top

Preparation

- 1. Cook the chestnuts in water until soft.
- Mush them well with an electric whisk in a large bowl
- Add the ricotta, sugar, chocolate, and maraschino
- 4. Mix well and divide into suitable dishes
- 5. Top it with whisked cream whirls and sprinkle cocoa powder over the top to finish

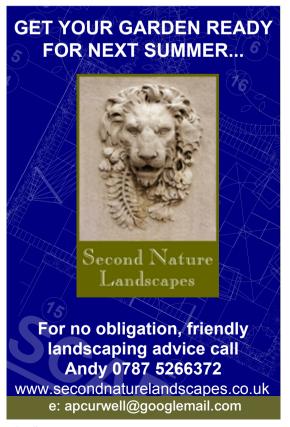

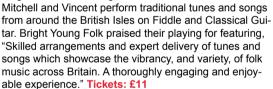

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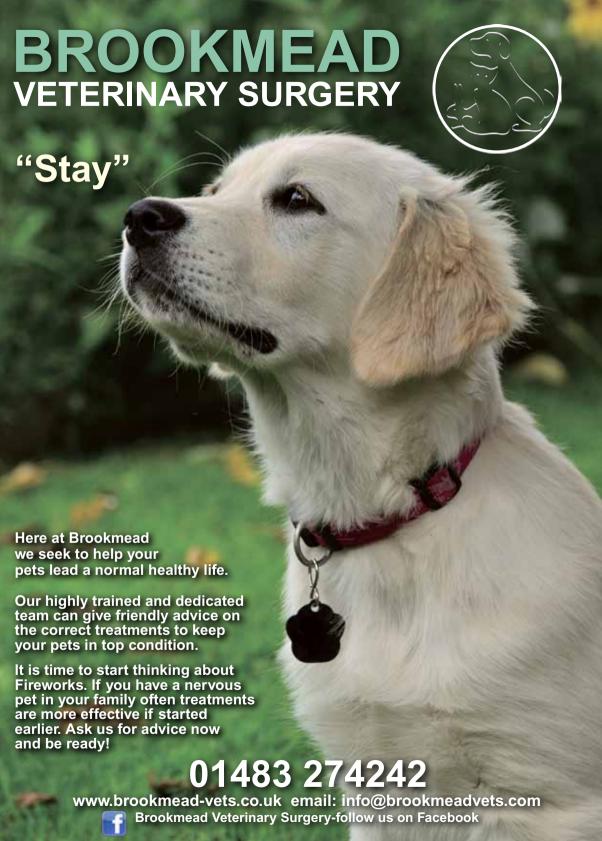












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
