





# Joy Horn brings some anecdotes of 100 years ago



n Saturday, December 14th, Christmas shopping was not uppermost in Cranleigh people's minds. It was election day – the first general election for eight years – and 654 Cranleigh women over 30 were voting for the very first time. In the country, the electorate rose from 7.7m to 21.4m, and in the Cranleigh ward of Guildford constituency it increased from 516 property-holding men in 1910 to 1,311 people in 1918. This now included all men over 21 (and not just property-owners), besides the women. It was not until 1928 that all women over 21 gained the vote. There had been petitions to parliament on the subject since 1832.

Among the women now entitled to vote were the mothers of the soldiers these articles have been following throughout the war. They were Mrs Annie Crick of the Northampton Boot Store, mother of Rennie Crick of the R.A.M.C., and Mrs Ruth Cheesman, mother of Joe Cheesman, who had been a prisoner-of-war: they were both able and competent women. Mrs Eliza Greenfield, mother of the three boys killed on the Somme, was also eligible. So was war widow Mrs Louisa Bowley of 'Chez Nous' in Grove Road, an enterprising woman who had run a chicken farm on her extensive grounds in order to support her three children.

Being able to vote must have been a particular satisfaction for the Cranleigh artist, Marjorie Hamilton, who had designed posters for national suffragette demonstrations. She was registered on the electoral register as living at 'Rosemary Cottage' in Avenue

Road, but was said to be absent on military service – the only such woman in Cranleigh. So far, research has failed to discover what she was doing, or where.

Sadly, Mrs Florence Parsons and Mrs Alice Nightingale, who figure on the electoral register as qualified to vote, had both died in November of the Spanish Flu.

There were only two candidates for the Guildford seat: Edgar Horne (Conservative), who lived at Hall Place, Shackleford, and had been elected in 1910, and William Bennett (Labour), a pharmacist of York Road, Guildford. The Surrey Advertiser was blatantly partisan in its support of Edgar Horne, reporting on all his public meetings in the villages – even though he said much the same each time – and giving very little coverage to William Bennett, and most of that unfavourable. At Alfold, Mr Horne 'welcomed the presence of ladies as an indication that they intended to take their new responsibilities seriously'(!) His meeting at Cranleigh Village Hall was at 8.00pm on Saturday December 7th, after he had made a quick dash from a 7.00pm meeting at Ewhurst.

The votes in this 'Khaki' election were not counted until December 28th, because of the time needed to gather the forces' votes. In Cranleigh, 119 voters were absent on naval or military duty. Some ballot papers were spoiled by voters writing 'Good luck!' next to one or other candidate, or even 'Nothing doing'!

Lloyd George swept back to power at the head of a continued Liberal-Conservative coalition, on a platform promising a trial for the Kaiser and indemnities from Germany, and 'a fit country for heroes'. In Guildford, Edgar Horne received 13,149 votes to Bennett's 5,078.

Christmas must have been celebrated with relief and thankfulness in Cranleigh and by those serving in the Armed Forces. After his exciting escape from German imprisonment through Holland, Joe Cheesman had reached home in Victoria Road in

November and was allowed to stay in Cranleigh for Christmas, though he was not yet demobilised. In France, Rennie Crick had been made demobilisation clerk for the 34th Field Ambulance ('Some job!', he commented in his diary) and sent home two batches of miners, as priority workers. He enjoyed a 'fine spread' at the hospital on Christmas Day, with dancing and singing in the evening.

# Crane Spotter: tales from a Cranleigh birder December Black snow fooling

can't be sure if it will be a white Christmas this year – but it will certainly be a black one.

Each December, as the daylight fades ever earlier and people scurry ever faster to squeeze in the last of their shopping before the happy day, a spectacular display takes place in the skies above Cranleigh High Street.

A whirling mass of up to 200 Jackdaw are jousting excitedly as they showcase their nightly winter warm-up before flying off to roost.

You can't easily miss these noisy tumblers with their shrill cries of 'Jack! Jack!' drowning out the village's increasingly heavy traffic.

It's a black blizzard as they gang up and fool around, careering in all directions like crazed youths who've overdone their first encounter with the Christmas punch.

Jackdaws know exactly how to make themselves at home in our village and they are faithful to one another too. They don't appear to want to wander far. One ringed back in 1949 was found dead just over four years later – but he only got as far as Guildford.

They may look black at a distance but see them closely and they are clearly mostly grey on the head, breast, underparts and legs. Just above the stubby bill is a blackish 'cap', lodged so far forward it looks as if it is about to fall off.

These jovial jousters do exactly what they want to do. When they want to. And where they want to.

Who's that shouting out in the dead of night? Jackdaw. What's the bird regularly waking us up first on a winter's morning? Jackdaw.

Who is it hammering on our roof to dig up the moss and get at the grubs below? Him again. And who is trying to set fire to our older buildings by stuffing sticks for its nest down the chimney? You guessed it.

Out on the streets around here they can be vandals, raiding the litter bins, tossing wrappings across the pavements, and poking around where they are not wanted. But I'd sooner it was them, not the local rat population, snatching up the remnants of last night's discarded takeaways.

Jackdaws, about three quarters of the size of the Carrion Crow – to which they are related – appear to be everywhere. They are common in the fields too with their 'big brother' and Rooks, tackling unharvested maize at this time of year that has been left for the Pheasants.

They've also got special built-in Google Maps features wired to their brain. How else could their beady white eyes hone-in so quickly on the crusts we put out for our songbirds on the bird table?

At least they seem to be programmed to be polite, taking only one piece of bread at a time in a fast drop and grab manoeuvre before flying off to scoff in a nearby tree. This gives their mates – inevitably right behind them – a chance to dive in and grab a bite too.

Some people might suspect these birds are so much part of the Cranleigh scene that they have got their own pub sign in the High Street.

Just look outside The Richard Onslow - formerly named The Onslow Arms before new owners

And why is the Chough on the Onslow coat of arms? My inquiries took me to historians, the National Trust, the Onslow family, the pub and others. To no avail.

Someone suggested it might be because of the Onslow family's Shropshire roots, where maybe Choughs abounded. But it is not a bird of that county either.

My search eventually ended with a discussion at the College of Arms in London where the most helpful and knowledgeable Robert Noel informed me of the consensus of him and his colleagues in the library.

He told me: 'It must be because an early Onslow had a devotion to St Thomas of Canterbury . . . . one guesses an early Onslow must have belonged to a guild that had St Thomas as his patron, although we can't be sure.'

St Thomas, also known as Thomas à Becket, was of course Archbishop of Canterbury from 1162 until his assassination by King Henry II's knights on 29 December 1170.

His - and Canterbury's - coat of arms depict Choughs, which feature in various ancient religious mythology. Later the birds were known as 'beckits'.


The puzzle was answered – and was I chuffed.





From stop motion animation to model making to monster making, I always had heroes who I looked up to. In those days there was no internet or anything of the sort, so the only way to research and discover who people were and how things were done was via magazines. I would spend all my pocket money on trips to Forbidden Planet in London, which was a tiny shop at the time in Denmark Street. Buying magazines for scraps of information on how to recreate the models and monsters I was fascinated by.

I can even remember writing to the BBC at one point to ask them how American Werewolf was made. They wouldn't have known of course, but they kindly wrote me a letter back saying that they thought it was Yak's hair that had been used. This of course was an absolute gem of information for me and I thought 'right ok, I need to get my hands on some yak's hair!'

So, in short, I was always looking for inspiration and ways that I could do and create my own works of art, and that's how it all started.

After leaving school, it was very difficult to find work artistically. I went on to study Art at Godalming College and then did a foundation course at East Surrey College of Art and Design in Reigate around 1987. I really enjoyed it there and felt that it helped me to push my boundaries as an artist. Oddly it pushed me not into superior materials, but into what seemed like inferior materials such as cardboard. MVP (minimum viable product) as I've learnt from the corporate world!



So, I was doing a lot of cardboard sculpting, as well as doing my own latex masks and monsters on the side. However, I was still keen to specialise in something and further my education, so I attended various model

making courses and started to interview with universities. In particular I was interviewed at Wolverhampton Polytechnic, where they infamously told me that some of my work was better than that of their second years. I was grateful for the compliment, but at 18 I was still desperate to be taught and develop my skills, but that was it, they wouldn't let me in!

At that point I was forced to go out and find work for myself. Which in hindsight was positive as it meant I wasn't wasting 3 years at university.

I eventually got 2 weeks work at Spitting Image in 1988, helping to repair the satirical puppets. In particular I repaired Sir John Gielgud and I put the eyes in Jessie Jackson, who was an American politician and preacher at the time. Then I also worked on a children's programme called Round The Bend, making various cartoon spoofs of popstars at the time, there was 'Mudonna' 'Rick Ashtray', 'Dross', 'Swill Collins' and so on.

However, that was only a few weeks work. The creative industry always has been, and I think still is, very closed doors. You have to literally go and knock on doors, kick doors down or know someone in order to get ahead. I found out far too late that connections are the key to getting into places and meeting people.







Painting the Ninja Turtles'

It wasn't until about a year later in 1989 that I got another 'proper' job and that was working on Teenage Mutant Ninja Turtles. I had a few months on that and then there was the second sequel in 1990. After that was a TV series called Dinosaurs which people may remember, which had a family of cartoon type dinosaurs. I was doing similar jobs that I'd done before, which was the trimming and seaming of all of the foam costumes and bits and bobs that came out the moulds. It was a bit of a boring job but essential nonetheless.

So, these were effectively my university years.

I've always been self-employed, but I think it's important to stress that I've not always done super well. I had a great start, but maintaining a career in the creative industry has been very difficult for me, and has certainly come with it's ups and downs. I've also always had to

supplement my income by taking other jobs on the side. I've worked in party shops, toy shops, Debenhams, Waitrose and been a waiter too. Just like a jobbing actor, during resting periods, you have to do what's necessary to get by.

The thing that kept me going was just an absolute love for the job. People always say do what you love, and I absolutely agree with that, but there are always sacrifices. You have to be prepared that you won't always get work in what you want to do.

By 1992 I'd found work as a prop maker at the Guildford School of Acting. Most memorably making a huge pig carcass for a show set in an abattoir. After that I got a job working on the Borrowers TV series, working under William Rigby, which was fantastic. I made a giant dead mouse, giant flowers and helped to make all of the giant grass that was used.

After that point jobs became fairly erratic. In 1994 I got another job through William Rigby making a Cactus Costume for Bjork for the MTV music awards, which I later found out was for the camera man! I actually found a video of it being worn recently on Youtube.

By 1996 I was working in Manchester, sculpting at a company called Mackinnon and Saunders and Saunders, who are quite well known in the industry. I worked on various things, adverts, animations, characters and maquettes'.

I was also in Bristol for a while working at Aardman Animations who are the Wallace and Gromit people, and was working on adverts for brands like Quavers and Monster Munch and then infamously the last video that Spice Girls did, which was called Viva Forever. They were represented as these tin toys. I thought they were horrible at the time, but everyone loves them now!

However, by 1997 I was back in Godalming living with my parents.

Then, I got the call to work on Star Wars. At last this was it, I thought. After all of the work I thought 'this is it, I've made it finally, I'm at the top!'.

It was for The Phantom Menace, which was the first of the prequels, and I was in the creature's department, doing the same kind of jobs as I'd done before on Teenage Mutant Ninja Turtles and Dinosaurs. It was factory line work, a bit boring, and not entirely skilled, but I got talking to people and managed to get onto a different crew, which was helping to puppeteer the puppet of C3P0. It wasn't a man in a suit at this point.



#### Model design

It was an enormous number of hours and the job really took its toll on me. I had a 2-hour commute either way to the studios in Watford (which is now the Harry Potter Tour). I had to be there at 7am in order to be let in, and wouldn't leave until between 7-10pm at night. It was truly exhausting.

I experienced a lot of great things and put a huge amount of effort into networking and getting ahead. However soon after the job ended, I was working full time in Debenhams warehouse. It was awful, but I had to do it. I had no other work, I was living back with my parents, and had no money.

At this point it was my dissatisfaction at the jobs I was working in that spurred me on in my creative pursuits. Even whilst I was at Debenhams I would be constantly drawing and making things out of the old cardboard boxes!




By 2000, I'd managed to get some work at the National Archives, doing some exhibition work for things like the Hearth Tax, and the Missing Dimension, MI5 Files, Victorian Christmas etc. and following that, I was commissioned to make a big dragon costume, for English Heritage.

I'm not good at business, and one of the reasons I haven't quite managed to make a career in the art world is that I'm no good with money. If someone says I've only got £50 for a job I tend to say yes, because I need the work. Whereas in reality, it might cost 100's of pounds to get the job done.

I then moved into theatrical work and smaller prop making. I made a giant 6ft tall Hound of the Baskervilles for an outdoor theatrical production and an 8ft Skeleton puppet costume for the Youth Music Theatre of the UK, for Roald Dahl's production of Mort in 2007/2008. I had a studio space in Godalming where the old fire station used to be.

Next, I got a job with Lionhead Studios in Guildford who were making computer games, most notably, Fable 2. They required some physical sculpts of character's faces for workshops and meetings etc. Again, I thought to myself 'I've made it! I'm in!' I decided I would take my traditional skills into the digital world and retrain. However unfortunately that wasn't the case, and after a few weeks making the sculptures, they no longer required my services.

By this point I'd had to diversify my skills so much that I had become a Jack of All Trades and Master of None. Digital retraining was something I put some time into, I attended courses, and went to see a top digital firm. They said they could see that I had the traditional skills, but I was then told that I was 2 years behind a graduate in that field.



3D Model design



It was simply so hard to keep up.

By 2011, I was doing work for a company is Haselmere called Bang Creations, who were a worldwide product and toy design company. I was designing and sculpting toys and kits. The most successful thing I made was a card folding kit called Rivetz Kits. There was a car, a dragon, a wasp, a stealth fighter, all sorts. I had to design the prototypes which where sent to China and turned into a kit. It was the first time I'd seen something I'd created in a shop. I saw them in Hobby Craft, W H Smiths etc, and of course people then say to you 'Oh this is great, you must be doing well, and getting royalties off this'. But in actual fact, it's a tiny amount of money to do one job, and then that's that.














From 2011, I gave up prop making all together. It was killing me. I was 40 something by this stage, struggling with money and just couldn't keep up. The passion I once had for the job had well and truly vanished.

I started working for a corporate communications company called DPA. Doing everything from sketches to video editing, to cleaning and sticking labels on CDs! In turn they introduced me to the word of corporate events, and even asked if I could sketch at some events. Which thankfully turned out to be a lot better paid than the majority of similar previous jobs.

Since then I've worked for brands like Sony, making giant phones to hang from the ceiling at their events, as well as doing live scribing during talks, where I draw the theme and topic of the talk, so that it becomes a living moving environment to help engage and inspire the delegates.

So here I am retraining myself again for the corporate world, using all my traditional skills, imagination, and innovation.

In terms of my future aspirations, I would like to return to my first love, which was always stop motion animation.

Technology has moved forward now in such a way that it's so much more accessible. I've always struggled with the concept of working to bring someone else's ideas to life in a factory line scenario.

The first thing I do when I wake up in the morning is to jot down all of the mad ideas that I've had and characters that I've come up with. My ultimate aspiration is to utilise my imagination and bring my own creations to life.

# Local business owner supporting elderly during winter

#### Winter Health - Frequently Asked Questions

The weather in the UK is anything if unpredictable and, if last winter's 'Beast from the East' is anything to go by, you can never be too prepared! Long-range forecasts for Surrey suggest we're in for a mild and wet first half of winter. Many of us associate late autumn and early winter with Halloween, Bonfire Night, and, of course, Christmas. However, during this festive season, with higher than average temperatures for the time of year, a high percentage of us will unfortunately fall victim to bugs and viruses that thrive in such conditions.

Many think they have all the answers when it comes to managing their winter health. Laura Jones, owner of local in-home care provider, Caremark, puts the rumours to rest and sets the winter health record straight, once and for all.

#### FAQ - Does the flu jab give you flu?

A common misconception about the flu jab is that a small strain of the infection is administered, giving you flu like symptoms and, in turn, a less serious bout of the infection. This is completely untrue, as the vaccine doesn't contain any live viruses. Whilst a slight temperature or aching muscles is common after a flu jab, this often subsides within a matter of hours.

#### FAQ – If we're in for a milder winter, surely there's less risk of illness?

Whilst coughs and colds are usually harder to treat during colder weather, the warmer weather often encourages the spread of infection. The unpredictable weather in the UK is often the culprit when it comes to the rapid increase of a particular illness and the elderly can be more vulnerable. The colder weather supresses the immune system, increasing the risk of repository conditions, but spikes of warmer weather encourages the infection to multiply.

Maintaining a healthy and active lifestyle can combat any weaknesses in the immune system. Keep an eye on the short-term and long-term weather predictions, making sure you wrap up warm on those chillier days and opt for light layers on the warmer ones.

#### FAQ – Will eating extra fruit and veg in the winter help keep the bugs at bay?

We're all well aware of the fact that eating our 'five a day' is a fundamental part of a healthy and happy lifestyle but, during the colder months, your body needs a little more TI C

Vitamins and minerals are an essential component of our daily intake and, whilst you're probably getting some of what you need from your diet, it may be beneficial to stock up on a few supplements. During cold weather, it's tempting – and often, obligatory – to stay inside. Natural sunlight is the most effective source of Vitamin D – the nutrients needed to keep bones, teeth and muscles healthy – so if you find yourself struggling to get out and about in the winter, stock up on some supplements.

#### FAQ – If I'm feeling under the weather, can't I just call the doctor and get some antibiotics?

Most of the infections spread during any time of the year are caused by viruses, whereas antibiotics only work against bacteria. Whilst it's crucial to monitor any health complaints or illnesses, it's also important to regularly update your loved ones on your symptoms, in case they might need to contact your doctor on your behalf.

Plan for who you might contact if you suddenly start to feel under the weather, especially if the symptoms progress quickly. Include friends or neighbours who have access to their own car – specifically one equipped for bad weather conditions – and if you have a large family, or lots of friends and neighbours who care for you, put together a phone tree, so that you only have to make one or two calls. If you start to decline quickly, call your GP, the NHS 111 helpline or, in an emergency, call 999.

Laura summarises: "At Caremark Mid Surrey, we begin making provisions for the winter when the long-term weather forecasts are released. Whilst they regularly change, it's crucial that we plan for all eventualities and make sure all clients are accounted for. I often think that planning for the worst is the only way to prepare, as we never know how we will fare when bad weather rolls in! It's always a great idea to stock up on those essential food items and household supplies, as this will allow for you to remain at home for long spells of bad weather. With that being said, it's just as important to get out and about as often as you can and check in with others who may have issues with their mobility. If there's two things we're good at in the UK, it's complaining about the weather and rallying around to help each other through it!"



s I consider yet another Christmas, I am reminded of the old song 'All I want for Christmas are my two front teeth'! What would be your ideal gift this Christmas? For some it may be the gift of sight, for others a new kidney or heart, for others the gift of a prosthetic limb. For the thousands who suffer in silence with cancer, dementia, MS, motor neurone disease and countless other diseases what do they long for at Christmas?

As one who is fortunate to not be in pain every day, my desire, if placed in that situation, would be for the gift of health. As scientific research continues to advance, two of the most important discoveries made in my opinion are those of epigenetics and nutrigenomics. Before you reach for your dictionary or close the magazine let me try and explain.

Epigenetics, simply put, is the study of biological mechanisms that will switch genes on and off. It's the study of how your environment, both internal and external, causes genes to become active or dormant. Our belief used to be that we are born with a certain set of genes and that was final. Our understanding now is that what we eat and drink, where we live, how we exercise, how we sleep, our stress levels, interaction with other people and our chemical consumption all have the ability to cause genes to remain dormant (off) or active (on). Why is this important? Genes are the directors of our bodily processes, they provide instructions on how to make important proteins - complex molecules which trigger various biological actions to carry out life functions. The modification of our cells leaves marks called epigenetic marks and these are passed from one cell to another when they



with an individual's health condition, and have used food and plants as medicines. Hippocrates, a famous Greek physician, said 'let food be your medicine and medicine be your food'.

With the advance of science, scientists started questioning if the interaction between genes and food bioactive compounds could positively or negatively influence an individual's health.

The discovery of the interaction between nutrients and genes at a molecular level has aided the prescription of customised diets according to each individual's genotype (their set of genes). These are both very new areas of research but the ramifications are potentially huge.

#### The future looks so exciting!

With all this new information how can we give ourselves the gift of health?

#### Here are my suggestions:

- 1. Eat a fistful of protein at every meal to balance your blood sugar and prevent those energy slumps and cravings for sweet things. Protein foods include lean red meat; fish; eggs; turkey/chicken; nuts and seeds: pulses and beans. Aim for grass fed meat twice a week max, and use free range eggs and poultrv if you can.
- 2. Eat oily fish 2-3 times a week for your essential healthy fats. These are required for the brain and nervous system, to reduce inflammation in the body and will help with weight loss too. Remember SMASH fish (Salmon, Mackerel, Anchovies, Sardines, Herrings). Avocados, nuts and seeds are also full of essential fats.
- 3. Avoid sugar and refined carbohydrates as these are simple carbs: high calorie, low nutrient foods which cause blood sugar levels to fluctuate, possibly leading to insulin resistance. Complex carbs release energy slowly and help to maintain constant energy levels. They are high fibre foods and are especially important in promoting bowel regularity and helping to control cholesterol. Complex carbs include whole grains, vegetables and beans.
- 4. Eat 8-10 portions of vegetables and fruit a day. mostly vegetables, as these are high in vitamins, minerals and antioxidants; vitally important for all the metabolic processes in the body and for mopping up free radicals which can lead to premature ageing and degenerative diseases.
- 5. Aim to drink enough water a day so that your urine is pale straw in colour. This includes herbal teas but not coffee, tea or alcohol as these dehydrate the body.
- 6. Aim for a good sleep routine as sleep is vital for the body to repair itself.
- 7. Walk briskly for 20 minutes every day for your heart health.
- 8. Reduce your chemical load by cutting out processed foods, eating whole foods and using more natural body, household and skincare products.





owleys Centre for the Community in Cranleigh always has a warm welcome for visitors but this year it will be even warmer, thanks to the Community Foundation for Surrey which has awarded a grant for a new boiler.

The Community Foundation for Surrey Director of Grants and Impact, Kate Peters added: "The Community Foundation is delighted to be able to support this valuable community resource. It is quite an unusual grant for us. We are not able to make many capital grants, but with winter approaching we recognise the importance of providing a warm and comfortable venue for older members of the community to meet and socialise".

The Community Foundation for Surrey is part of a national network of 46 Community Foundations which collectively expect to award £100M in grants this year. We now have some new ways to contact the practice. One of these is online consultation between patients and the practice, accessed via our website www.cranleighmedicalpractice.com. It can be used to ask for advice or treatment, especially if you are unsure whether you need an appointment or not, to update your GP about an on-going condition, or following a trial of medication, or to request administrative help such as sick note renewal, referrals or to request a letter from your GP. There is also advice on how to manage your condition yourself, over the counter treatments and out of hours contacts.

Don't forget to book your flu vaccine this year! You need to have a flu vaccine each year to reduce your risk of getting flu. You should have the flu vaccine if you are 65 year of age or over, are pregnant, have a long term medical condition (e.g. asthma or diabetes) or if you are the main carer for an elderly or disabled person. Book online via online services, or contact the practice.

If you are not yet signed up for online services, please bring photo ID to Reception to activate your account. You can book appointments, request medication and view your medical record, on your computer, tablet or via an app on your phone.

# he month of December focuses on Christmas and the meal for that day is by tradition more a banquet than the three course meal we have during the rest of the year. 75 years ago, this was a very different Christmas meal to what we have these days.

# RISOTTO CON FUNGHI (Mushroom Risotto) Serves 4

# Ingredients

160g of Italian rice

30g sun dried mushrooms broken into small pieces

50g finely sliced onions

50g finely chopped celery

2 cloves of garlic crushed and chopped 25mls of oil

25g margarine + 25g of butter 120mls dry white wine 50g grated Parmesan cheese

4 large fresh mushrooms

800mls of good stock Salt and peppermill

## **Preparation**

(The night before, soak the dried mushrooms in the wine, cover and keep in a cool place)

- 1. Using a suitable saucepan, fry the vegetable in the hot oil and margarine until golden brown
- 2. Stir in the rice and when well mixed with the vegetables add the wine and mushrooms
- 3. Gradually add the stock stirring all the time over a moderate heat
- 4. Cook the 4 large mushrooms separately and keep them warm
- 5. The risotto is ready when "al dente" and if too dry a little water can be added
- 6. At this stage the butter is added mixing it well with the rice then add half the Parmesan
- 7. Adjust the seasoning and serve the risotto in a large dish with the large mushrooms on top
- 8. Serve the rest of the Parmesan separately

A good white wine will be appreciated: Soave or Orvieto secco.

# ARROSTO D' OCA NATALIZIA

(Roasted Christmas Goose) Serves 4

## Ingredients

1 x 4 to 5kg Goose trussed ready for the oven (Rawlings the butcher take such orders)

- 1 large carrot roughly chopped
- 2 sticks of celery
- 1 large onion
- 3 cloves of garlic crushed
- 4 bay leaves
- 1 large sprig of sage

600mls of strong stock

150mls of red wine or 100mls of Port

20g of thickening agent

Salt and Peppermill

### Preparation

- 1. On a metal oven tray with a little water place the trussed goose
- 2. Sprinkle it generously with salt and peppermill
- 3. Place in a preheated oven at 200°C for 30 minutes then take the tray out of the oven
- 4. Lift the goose and place the chopped



vegetables on the tray and the goose on it 5. Place back in the oven at 180° C and cook for 1 hour

- 6. After that, reduce the heat to 150°C and start basting regularly every 20 minutes for a further one and half hour
- 7. At the end of the above time, check the temperature in the breast and in the leg joint
- 8. If the temperature is at least 75°C the goose is cooked. Take the bird out of the oven tray, keep it hot while the sauce is made
- 9. In a suitable saucepan place half the roasted vegetables liquidise them, add the stock and the wine or port. Bring to the boil and thicken the sauce to the consistency required
- 10. Serve the goose with a compote of apples with added finely chopped sage
- 11. Roast potatoes, Cauliflower in white sauce and a green salad will be an adequate accompaniment

**PANETTONE** (Serves 4)

This is the traditional Italian dessert served at Christmas, is readily available in Sainsbury's the weeks preceding

a Panettone at Christmas every year as thanks to my father the parish organist. The local Monsignor (a senior priest who ranked just below Bishop) was a very generous man who helped my family when my father lost his job in 1934 when Mussolini decreed that all teachers must be members of the fascist party. It was certainly a different life back then.

The pansies never smiled today The daffodils grew shorter, As if they knew she wouldn't be round To change their dirty water.



The ladybird who on the pew Flew home each day she dusted. Just cried for hours in to the font A friendship, oh so trusted.



She liked communion on a Sunday The holy bread and wine, She gave her soul to heal the sick But never counted time.





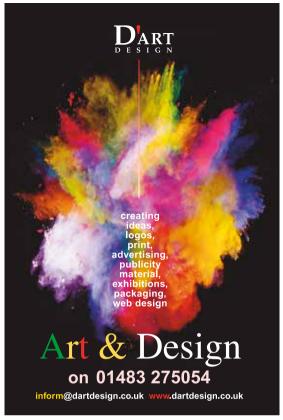

ranleigh Country Market, formerly Cranleigh WI Market, has been part of Cranleigh's local Friday morning life since March 1980.



# The Pocahontas Monatorium?

Technology impacts on every aspect of our lives from communications to cars, and local author. Rob James, grew up steeped in its development. His father was a design engineer at BAe Dunsfold and, with Joe's passing over 25 years ago, Rob could only wonder at his possible reaction to today's, taken-for-granted, technology. Just suppose however, we could take a modern car or iPhone back in time. What would Joe make of them and what impact could this 'out of time technology' have on the past?

In his maiden book, The Pocahontas Moratorium, through its two protagonists, Roger Matthews and Ian Pearce, Rob takes us back to 1972 in a VW Touran. Through his work, Roger's father has become embroiled in a scheme to prevent the theft of plans for a secret military aircraft by Russian spies and, using his visitor's new technology, wants their help. In addition to a pacey plot, the time travellers experience some of the more mundane and wry aspects of an unexpected journey such as, needing a change of clothes and toiletries when they've got no money.

On their return to the 21st Century, they find that they have become something a cause célèbre attracting the interest of both the press and the scientific community. A Government Department, concerned about the threat of future technology corrupting the time continuum, imposes a ban on time travel. It becomes known as The Pocahontas Moratorium and it effectively prevents a return to 1972 to resolve unfinished business.
