







# Joy of Cranleigh Joy Horn brings some anecdotes from past times

'The Joy of Cranleigh' is presenting a series of several Vanished Buildings of Cranleigh


**The Vanished Bruford's** 



The Steam Brewery, Osbourn's Garage and The Three Horseshoes, about 1913

t is amazing that such a large and substantial building as Bruford's Steam Brewery could have vanished without trace and been forgotten. For thirty to forty years it stood in a prominent position right on the High Street (known as 'The Street' then), between Broadoak, house of the village doctor, and the Three Horseshoes. It was in full operation by 1881, giving employment to many Cranleigh men who worked as clerks, draymen, coopers, bottlers, cellarmen and mineral water makers. Presumably, too, it would have given its distinctive smell to this end of Cranleigh.

Bruford's stables were on the opposite side of the road, behind the Arts Centre, on the site of the present house called 'Old Court'. The horses pulling a dray with casks must have been a frequent sight as they trundled through the village.





Bruford's Brewery in the early 20th century


The advert of 1910 shows a wide variety of drinks made in the brewery or supplied by them. Those were the days when a dozen bottles of lemonade could be bought for one shilling (5p in today's money) or a dozen pint bottles of pale ale for three shillings (15p).

Bruford's Steam Brewery owned the next-door pub, the Three Horseshoes, and also the White Hart in Ewhurst Road.

The brewery's trademark was three horseshoes, as seen on their stone bottle. Inside the pub is a useful chart of the beer-making process that would have taken place in the brewery.

Out of sight behind the brewery was Brewery Cottage. It was called this in 1911, when Joseph Burton was renting it from Bruford's for £26 a year. He was a cooper or barrel-maker for the brewery. The cottage is one of the oldest buildings in Cranleigh, having been assigned a date of 1445 by the process of dendro-dating. The angle of the roof suggests that it was originally thatched.

Soon after 1910, the brewery was taken over by a larger one which began reducing its operations in Cranleigh. By 1913 it was partly dismantled, and Frank Osbourn had moved his car saleroom/garage to the front of the site. Osbourn started his business in 1910, with a small garage in Ewhurst Road (where the Chinese restaurant, Forbidden City, now is), but the growing popularity of motor cars meant that his



business expanded rapidly. It seems, by comparing the old pictures of Bruford's and Osbourn's, that the brewery buildings fronting the Street were adapted for the car saleroom.

After many years as a car salesroom and petrol station, the brewery site was bought by ESSO in 1988. When the buildings there were demolished, the

almost-forgotten Brewery Cottage was revealed. It narrowly escaped demolition itself, until local people succeeded in having it listed as a Grade 2 building, which limited the extent to which it could be altered. It is now the shop of ESSO's Little Manor service station. The name 'Little Manor' doesn't have any historical justification, but it sounds attractive. It may well be the oldest petrol station shop in Britain.

The Cranleigh History Society meets on the 2nd Thursday of each month. The next meeting will be an outing on Thursday April 11th to the Watts Chapel, Compton, assembling there at 2.30pm.

# April

## **Blown away by Nightingales**



ny day now and they will be enchanting us with their magical music again.

The Nightingale will be back – but only in all too few of the remaining copses to host them in the south of England.

Their return from Africa is usually heard around here from the second week of April and this year marks a special anniversary. Next month on the 19th May it will be 95 years since one in a Surrey garden enthralled a nation in the first ever live wildlife broadcast.

Back in 1924, BBC Radio featured what was to become a famous duet, cellist Beatrice Harrison playing Londonderry Air (Danny Boy) in her Oxted garden, with haunting accompaniment from a Nightingale in full song.

Annual concerts continued until World War II following her discovery that Nightingales in the woods around her home would respond to her instrument and sing as if in a duet.

Eighteen years on and the BBC made an even more memorable recording, from the same garden, three years into World War II on May 19th 1942. This poignant piece you can still hear on YouTube.

The broadcast was cut short for security reasons when 197 Wellington and Lancaster bombers flew overhead on their way to raid Mannheim in Germany. But the recording continued.

You can hear the distant drone of the returning engines - 11 fewer - increasingly louder as they pass overhead and then gradually fade away into the distance. But the unperturbed Nightingale sings on regardless and survives an auditory bombardment. Beauty, for a few moments, eclipses the beast of war.

Hear them we still do but seeing one is much harder and it is probably true to say that most people who have heard one have never seen one. Darkness is a big reason, but they are shy birds and their brilliant song means they don't need to show themselves much to attract a mate, even in the day.



If you do spot one emerging from the undergrowth then you will be greeted by a plain looking bird that is a little longer than a Robin, is brownish above with a rounded reddish-brown tail, pink legs, a feint sandy bib and grey-white underparts.

Nightingale numbers of this increasingly scarce summer visitor and our best singer of the early summer fluctuate annually but the species is decreasing long-term.

How ironic that the road called Nightingales, on Cranleigh's Hitherwood estate, is so named, for it was built right across scrub land where the species was 'very common' in the 1950s and early 1960s (per Murray Hook, 1999).

I have made special efforts over the years to find this bird locally and my best tally was 10 singing males late last century, making Cranleigh and the surrounding area a hot spot' for this species at that time.

In other years the numbers have been much lower, or non-existent, but lack of observers may be largely to blame.

Males may be heard along the Downs Link old railway track, all the way down to the Sussex border and beyond, from the third week of April into May. But I have found they can turn up anywhere.

Surprise 'quick visits' while they were presumably still searching for a nesting area include Stocklund Square (not Berkeley Square) car park. Oh, what a disappointment to land there after a hazardous journey from such exotic places as Guinea, Senegal, Spain and The Pyrenees!

I also once had one in the hedge one night at Park Mead School. It belted out its song just after a rain shower. I first heard it over half a mile away and had difficulty locating it as one minute the song seemed to come from one direction and the next it was coming from the opposite - the result of the sound waves bouncing back off the houses.

Eventually I was privileged to stand a few feet beneath it and listened to an ear bursting solo as water dripped from the leaves onto my happy head. Nightingales are 'Daygales' too. While best heard at night they do also sing during the light hours.

Gatwick's constant plane procession around here tries to drown them out. But it has no more success than the bombers did, all those years ago.



# When they sang from every square . . .

Back in the 1800s everyone in Cranleigh and surrounding villages would have been familiar with Nightingales.

In the 1900 book the Birds Of Surrey, by John A Bucknill, he quotes this from a naturalist's essay\*:

'The neighbourhood of Godalming has been called the valley of Nightingales, and well it deserves the name; throughout the fine nights in May, there is a complete chorus of these birds; every coppice contains numbers, and every garden two or three pairs; it is really glorious to listen to them in a moonlight midnight, after a showery day.

'There is a stile under Ockford coppice, at the back of the town, on which I have sat for hours, listening to the hundred-tongued harmony, interrupted now and then by the sharp cry of the Screech Owl, as on noiseless wing he wound his way along the meadows, mouse-hunting...'

Sadly, every year the Nightingales attracted 'the London bird-catchers' with their traps and meal-worms 'and a great proportion of the earliest arrivals are conveyed to town.'

Even then, Bucknill remarked: 'No doubt the cutting down of copses and much building has to some extent decreased its numbers, and particularly so, of course, in the neighbourhood of towns...'

# People Profile



Steve Parsons Jewellery Designer

was born in 1960 in Chelsea, London and moved to Virginia Water in 1961 with my parents and brother, who was 4 years older than me.

The move was inspired by mine and my brother obsession with nature and my father's desire to raise the family outside of London. My dad was in the pub one day when someone said 'Oh there's someone down the road that's selling their little bungalow with half an acre of garden'. And that was it - we moved! I can remember my dad picked up my mum from Egham station and drove as fast as he could to the house, to make it seem as though the distance between being in the town and out of town was shorter! It seemed to work because they agreed to buy the house.

We were quite an artistic family. My Mum was a fashion designer, having studied fashion design and illustration.

When children came along, she branched into Ladybird books. In fact, she drew all the illustrations in those old stories, as well as various commissions for people.

My dad was a set designer in the film industry. He worked at Shepperton Studios which was fairly close to Virginia

Water, so he was able to travel to work very easily. However he worked on a self-employed basis and when the film industry started to struggle, he found himself in need of more regular work in order to support his growing family.

It was at this time that he joined PSC, a concrete firm, selling sand to the Arabs. My dad always had a certain charm about him and could be very persuasive, so he didn't have to do much to hit his targets over the 20 years he was there. He later made a good friend called Terry Richmond, who asked him to come and work for him in the oil industry.

My dad was in the SAS in the war and had worked out in the Middle East for a while so he knew the Arabs and the culture well. They would set up exhibitions to sell their products and he would design all the exhibition stands as well as selling from them.

As soon as my brother and I could hold a pencil in our hands we would be drawing and could always be kept quiet with a couple of crayons. When I was in primary school at Thorpe, a little village school, I excelled in art and knew even at that early stage that it was the way to go. It wasn't a chore to me. I was very influenced by my brother's love of nature and we used to draw a lot of birds.

I then attended Charter School in Sunningdale from 11 to 16 years old, where I was top of my class in Art. My teacher Mr Fry was great, but when he retired, the next teacher had us studying progressive art, which didn't really suit me. He was into surrealism and off the wall stuff, so sadly I lost interest for a little while.

While I was in my fourth year at Charters, I made a friend who introduced me to photography. I loved photography and was surprised by how scientific it was. I was fascinated by the fact that you could compose a picture and alter the final effects with different lighting techniques and thought it was great to photograph things you were really interested in. His parents had a place down in Cornwall and I used to spend almost all my summer holidays there. We had such good fun with photography and art. We would even draw up pretend invoices to each other and charge silly amounts of money for our work!

After I finished school, I didn't really know what I wanted to do. I had taken GCSE's and CSE's exams because I was sort of borderline at the time, but I didn't really apply myself in my studies if I wasn't interested and so I left school with pretty average exam results.

I then went to Windsor College, where I met a fabulous guy called Mike Roles who taught photography and we just had such a ball. I found my photography degree easy because it really interested me. While I was there, my dad said 'You really ought to go into the film industry, I think you'd like it because of your interests.'

At the end of my photography course I saw an advert in the paper in the film industry at British Aerospace. I went for an interview which went well but unfortunately there was a younger apprentice who'd come straight from school and knew all about film. However, it turned out they were so impressed with me that about a month later I got a call from them saying, 'Look we've got another position, not an apprenticeship, you will be a junior photographer'. Of course, I was delighted.

Fortunately, they agreed that I could work for them part-time while I finished my course and once I had my degree, I had a full-time job



ready and waiting. We filmed airplanes at the old British Aerospace site at Brooklands, which to be completely honest, I found pretty boring. The crew there were great though. We were working in the 'Bouncing Bombs' (Barnes Wallace's) office. The film archive was downstairs, with the original photographs of the bouncing bombs

We had the whole team there; sound crew, editing and so on. We quite enjoyed the elitism of it, truth be told. Other factories had things like weather machines for example, that could alter the weather for testing aircraft wings. We were often asked to go out and film at places for research. Sometimes they'd even make snow for us and we'd have snowball fights in the summer. It was great fun and we played just as hard as we worked in those days.

I found my forte in doing the titles at the beginning and end of films. In those days you had to electro set them all precisely, starting from the middle and working outwards. I fortunately never made a spelling error which is probably why they had me do it! I moved up from there to filming the aircrafts, but I still felt a sinking feeling deep in my heart that I wasn't achieving what I wanted. It was an empty hole that I couldn't fill.

'Still' photography was never an individual's work, so when taking a shot, apart from cropping it, the films went on to editors and sound people and by the time they were completed it wasn't your shot anymore. It belonged to a whole group of people and I found that dissatisfactory. So I started to look around for an alternative job, but couldn't find one.

It was around this time that I met my future wife. I was in a pub relaxing with friends following our Amateur Dramatics meet up, when we were joined by a group of girls that some of the lads knew. Alix was one of the girls and we started chatting that evening and then started dating. She was studying Microbiology at Ashford hospital at

the time, where they often held fancy dress parties. We would go along to the parties with our group of friends and of course we had the whole wardrobe of the Amateur Dramatics group to choose from. We would dress up in the most ridiculous outfits and go to these doctors and nurses' parties. Even there my artistic side showed itself. I recall a Halloween party at the hospital when together with our group of friends we went as a dragon in true Chinese style. Hidden beneath the dragon costume we arrived at the party in a great long line and then took the dragon costume off to reveal our Halloween regalia underneath!

Subsequently about 1980 when I was 20, Alix and I decided to go on holiday together though we couldn't afford much in those days. We drove up to Scotland in an old banger and toured around and it was just lovely. The scenery took me back to the ways of the country and reminded me of when I was really young. I engaged with the Scottish people, but what I really loved was discovering the little craft sites which completely caught my imagination. I was amazed that these folk would literally come out of College and set up their own studio, in the middle of nowhere and make a living out of it.

As we toured around, we found craft studios dotted around all over the place, in various little villages. There would be a group of them - one would do glassblowing, another jewellery and another one would be doing leatherwork. They seemed like fantastic communities to be involved with and everyone was individual and had their own ideas. Of course, they had to be commercial in a certain respect but it wasn't like down South where everyone had the pressure to be in a job that earned money.

I looked around the various studios and one really caught my imagination where they were melting gold from a solid to a liquid and forming it back into a different solid shape. That fascinated me with all the related technical skills;

hammering and raising a piece of silver and moulding it into a shape. One piece of jewellery that caught my eye, which I bought for my mother, was a piece of silver in the shape of a tree, with a piece of oak in the centre.


Combining the two materials was really lovely. It inspired me how it created something so special and individual that would never be found in a high street shop. So when I returned home something just clicked inside, jewellery making just seemed the right thing to do and everything fell into place after that holiday. I was with the person I ended up marrying and I'd discovered a career I really wanted to pursue. I knew it was something that would fulfil me constantly because of the individual design each day. For me the film industry work represented the same chores all the time. The jewellery designing would combine my love for nature and my artistic inclination.

Once I'd reached the decision I basically came home and announced it to my parents. My mum was fantastic. She'd always been right behind me and it was her who got me into the photography course in Windsor College initially. When I came back and spoke to her she said, "Well College is the way to go, you need proper training

for this." My parents always believed if you want to do something you've got to do it properly and I've taken that on too.

I had an interview at Epsom School of Art and Design, after my mum had found out all about it. I'd missed the September start date at that point but went and had a look around. I liked what I saw and they liked me. Aged 21 by then I was a mature student and my contemporaries there were 17-18. The enthusiasm I showed seemed to convince them and I was offered a place to get an independent degree. I was awarded a student's grant which was fantastic. It was a 3-year course - a proper degree. Working jewellers would come in and teach us, so it wasn't just our regular lecturer. We had various people come in from the industry adding interest, and it brought that side of things into our learning which was vital.

With a college course it gives you the summer holidays free. During that time I began looking for a job at the unemployment centre, when I saw this little card which said 'Jeweller required'. I couldn't believe my luck, an actual jeweller's job in the unemployment centre! I went for an interview with this young lad, who was younger than me. He absolutely loved jewellery and his parents had set him

up in business. I got the job and although the work was to a higher level than I was used to at college, he stuck with me.

We got along very well that summer and with his guidance I became proficient at fairly intricate jewellery work but when the summer break ended, I had to return to college. We kept in touch and at the weekends and in subsequent college holidays I would join his team. So when I finished my degree I had a job to step into. He paid me 80p an hour as a student but increased it to a pound once I was qualified!

There are many facets to jewellery; such as being a setter, a diamond mounter or an engraver. There's so much to choose from and normally you develop in one area and not another. I established myself there working for 2 and a half years. Then I met Kevin Rogers, who'd done the opposite of me. He left school and went straight into a 5 year apprenticeship up in Bond Street, London. The London Jewellers would come down to schools out of the city and look for talent. His school said he was brilliant at metalwork and they offered him a trial in London leading onto the apprenticeship. Eventually he got tired of commuting to London and set up in business in Woking which is where we met. We were a good blend – Kevin had the skills on the practical side and I had the artistic skills.

We agreed we didn't want to set up in a traditional jewellery business, we wanted to do something contemporary. I was living in Shalford at the time and he was living towards Mayford. As we looked around the area Kevin found Smithbrook Kilns. We chose the unit we thought was best, bought all the tooling required and set up. We have never looked back since.

On reflection we were a bit rash to give up on our previous jobs and step into something so new. Even though we were all set up and ready to go, people didn't just come through the door. We each knew certain other jewellers who we did work for, that was our base money. This gave us time to build up a collection to put in the unit window. We built a shelf and put a basket on it, no bigger than 2ft by 1ft. We added felt to line it and displayed our jewellery there. It was our sole collection, about 6 to 7 pieces, but they sold and business started to build up, slowly expanding to give us a steady income. On the back of this we were able to drop the trade work as we had enough customers. As business improved, we opened the unit next door to us, giving us a workshop in the shop. Subsequently we moved to another unit, purpose-built for us providing skylights for natural light to work with and a spacious showroom.

In 2000 we opened up a shop in Guildford and that location brought in more work. We had a nucleus of loyal customers, collecting our pieces, liking our work and wanting regular different designs. We established a pattern of holding a sort of 'fashion show' of pieces throughout the year. For example, we would create a collection for the

following year, show that first in the summer, and continue with more shows as we moved towards Christmas because that was our peak selling time. We'd invite our customers to enjoy some champagne and nibbles, clear the whole shop and put all the new pieces on display, about 20 to 30 in all. It took a whole year to design and makeup with Kevin's help. Our guests would see the

new pieces and we'd assess their response to establish which pieces were popular. People would gravitate to the design they liked, possibly even one or two. Those designs we would keep and expand. When the private views were happening if a collection didn't have a bangle for example, we would make one and some stud earrings and build on those collections every year. knock out the ones that didn't work, so the designs grew stronger all the time. There are designs in our collection today which I designed when I was at college and are still going.

When I started to design jewellery pieces, I would combine what I knew and loved from the countryside. As I said I was always into nature and leaves and drew designs from that. I knew about nature so I tried to develop simplistic designs, straight lines, curvatures found in nature. I expanded it from there. At that time fashions were different so over time I've had to convert or adapt them to see them through the trends. We've been through three or four downturns in the economy over the years and the iewellery market is always one of the first to be affected because basically it's isn't a necessity, you can't eat your necklace!

So we had to adapt and change in that respect but always kept the essence of our designs. We got other jewellers in and promoted British designers during difficult times over the years. My designs were 50% what we do, now they are 90%. We tended to find that we were selling our own stuff more than others. Theirs would be in fashion for a period and then go out of fashion. With our designs they have never really been 'in' nor been 'out' of fashion. People continue to wear designs they bought when we first started, because it's still wearable.

We've kept continuity in our showrooms. We don't sell things like watches which would have brands spoiling the look inside. Our showrooms are consistent throughout. There isn't one 'looker' in one corner and another in the opposite corner. That is really important to us. We wanted to maintain an artistic side to the design of the shelves to show the pieces off to their main advantage. If you've designed contemporary jewellery you don't want the standard felt to display it on. That's also where my photography came in useful in the early days. I would photograph our pieces. It was a complete journey. It's amazing how the jewellery combined everything I was good at. I could take a really cracking shot and it would sell, rather than an average shot.

Coming into the workshop is not like a job to me at all, it never has been. It's one of the reasons why we chose Smithbrook Kilns. The setting is close to nature here, a nice working environment, peaceful, away from the chaos. Just travel into Guildford and there's constant people and noise and I'm not comfortable in that environment.

I look at the world from the eyes of a Jeweller. I will see





shapes that would make a nice pair of earrings, or a broach. A bird flight might be a woodpecker going up and down in its flight pattern, which will inspire a shape to go into a chain, with its continuous line. There's lots of inspiration all around and of course it can be expanded and developed constantly.

Finding a name for the business was an interesting journey. Initially we were a 'Jewellery Studio'. In those early days, the term 'studio' wasn't used in many places. It was a working environment where people could come and see actual pieces being created. By the time we moved to Guildford, the term 'studio' was being used everywhere and jewellery was tagged onto everything and it had become a bit of a 'cottage craft'.

We decided we needed a catchier name. Because it was just the two of us, we didn't want to go under each other's names. That wouldn't be beneficial, it could cause conflict, so we came up with 'pure' to reflect the pure metals we used. We were working with silver, gold and platinum, all pure metals. I looked up 'pure' in a thesaurus for inspiration. It had 'Simon Pure' in there which apparently means 'The Real McCoy', 'What you see is what it is', 'Genuine Born'. I thought that was perfect. I imagined that if a professor came along, he would see the sign 'Simon Pure' and understand the full meaning of the name straightaway. It's also appealing as a name too which helps. The only problem is I'm now known as Simon Pure so I see it as my stage name alongside my real name.

If I had any tips for jewellery artists I think research is key. Don't just jump into things. Ask lots of questions, don't be shy. We take part in shows like the Islington Design show and there are a lot of students who come along and they back off when approached. It's a big shame because Designers wouldn't bite their heads off, they most generally want to inspire, give feedback and help because they were once in the same position. At the end of the day it's not what you know but who you know.

Looking back on my life, having artistic parents helped me to view the world differently and my trip to Scotland was most significant, a real turning point, I didn't even know about jewellery until then. Subconsciously I was al-





ways heading in an artistic direction but those early days and inspirational moments, 'diamond days', have fashioned me into the person that I am today.







# **MARGARET JOAN FONTEBASSO** 1931 - 2019

argaret, my wife passed away on the 20th of January this year after an illness she never took seriously, but that in the end caused her an agonising ending: she was 1 month short of her 88th birthday and was married to me for nearly 58.

Born Margaret Joan Yetman in Crawley, when it was a village as she used to remind me, and lived there until April 1960 where she changed from an accounting job to a more varied secretarial one at the Royal Hotel in Bognor Regis: that's where I met her.

She was a very reserved person, not easily distracted from what she was doing, especially by some Italian chef asking the most pertinent question when he, in all honesty did not the know the correct pronunciation of a particular word he was using, just a supercilious look that was what he got.

The ice, as I was calling it at the time, melted one day in Chichester where I went for the registration of an old banger (a 1932 Morris 8). Walking along West Street I saw her, when she realised who I was, (surprise, surprise) she greeted me with a...radiant smile! At first I thought she must have seen an old friend behind me and I was ready to cross the road, when she called my name. Well, well, well! Could she be the same person who looked at me superciliously 2 weeks before? Why YES, she was.

She asked me what I was doing and as I told her she replied, "you must be ready to have an English tea". I replied that I preferred coffee, but I was curious to find out the difference between what she was alluding to and any other teas. We entered the Tea Room at what used to be a MORAN department store and we had a Cream Tea. What a lovely surprise! Later when on holiday, we always had time for a Cream Tea. That's how it all began. We found that we liked the same kind of music,history and both enjoyed having serious discussions about morals in politics and religion.

One thing we did not agree on was FOOD! Margaret used to say that food is to live, while I was living for food. I believe she never really understood that as a chef, I too needed food to live, how could I pay my bills without it! Another thing we both enjoyed was late evenings strolls along the sea front and a cup of coffee at Macari's when open. We married the following April.

In 1971 we moved to Cranleigh where we both worked at Cranleigh School, I was the Catering Manager and she was the Book Shop Manageress. Eventually we purchased the house in Charts Close and that was her last house move. She died after two operations to clear an intestinal blockage. Her funeral was on the 12th of February at St Nicolas Church, where some 200 people paid their respects to a "true lovely lady" as she was described in the over 150 cards Dorothy, her sister and I received. From the depths of our hearts, we would like to thank all the writers and everyone for the kind words of sympathy and condolences, we were truly overwhelmed.

ncreasing research suggests that it's the sugar rather than the fat in our diets that is the major contributing factor to the obesity epidemic in the UK. White crystalline substances can be deceiving because their chemical structure hits the addictive centres in your brain and gives you that good feeling which you then want to repeat over and over again... Sugar, cocaine, pure nicotine all have the same effect on the 'reward' centres in your brain.

According to Professor John Yudkin in his book 'Pure, White and Deadly' there is no physiological requirement for sugar: all our nutritional needs can be met without the addition of white, brown or raw sugar to any food or drink.

Why is sugar bad for us? A high intake of sugar causes our blood sugar levels to shoot up, giving us that feel-good 'high' followed by a crashing slump that leaves us tired, irritable and craving more sugary

foods. This vicious cycle then sets us up for a whole range of chronic lifestyle diseases such as diabetes, heart disease and neurological diseases. This is due to the inflammatory effect which sugar has on the

For those of us who have already taken sugar out of our diets it's often the 'hidden' sugars in foods that catch us out. A few days ago I was in a local supermarket and out of interest checked out some of the so called 'healthy' plant/protein snack bars. Now remember that your body can only handle 4g of sugar in the bloodstream at any one time otherwise your pancreas is called into action secreting insulin, the fat storing hormone, to remove it and restore balance. I checked the ingredients in several of these bars and was horrified to find that on average the sugar content per 100g was 40g, which is equal to 2.5 tablespoons of sugar! Low fat and diet foods often contain hidden sugars in order to make them more palatable.

Soups, sauces and ready meals often contain high amounts as well.

How much sugar should I have? 5g per 100g is a good level to work with and therefore each of the 'healthy' bars I checked contained on average 14g sugar which is almost 3 times that amount. Also check the different types of sugars in a product, they tend to end in 'ose (glucose, dextrose, sucrose, mannose, lactose, sucralose, fructose). These are all forms of sugar. With the creation of sweeter fruit such as Pink Lady apples, an apple can contain over 20g sugar albeit natural. Here's a tip: slice 1/2 an apple and dip it in a nut butter. The fat will slow down the absorption of the sugar.

## How do I cut down on sugar?

- Become more aware of how much sugar is in a product
- 2. Make educated choices around food
- 3. Use the 'no more than 5g per 100g rule'
- **4.** Eat a palm sized piece of protein with every meal to balance blood sugars
- Replace high sugar tropical fruits with low sugar berries (frozen ones in the winter to reduce your carbon footprint)
- Avoid high sugar and caffeine energy drinks (add slices of lemon or berries to water instead to flavour it)
- Cut out all white foods (flours, rice, pasta, sugar, potatoes)
- Avoid sweeteners as these contain excitatory toxins to the brain.

No more brain fog or early morning low grade headaches, sugar cravings, energy slumps, lack of focus and concentration, improved bowel function, less inflammation and therefore a reduced risk of chronic lifestyle diseases, weight loss, improvement in skin tone and a fabulous feeling of wellness.



# Purple Polio

Secondly, the incredible weather in late February helped create an explosion of Giant Ruby purple crocus flowers on Cranleigh Common, where some 6,000 corms were planted (November 2016) in the shape of the Rotary Wheel. This planting exercise formed part of Rotary International's Foundation's Centenary Project **Purple4Polio** where they, together with the Royal Horticultural Society (RHS), facilitated the planting of some 5 million crocuses across Great Britain and Ireland.



Cranleigh's Rotary Crocus Wheel is 10m in diameter and lies adjacent to the pond on The Common. The planting exercise was organised by Cranleigh Rotary Members who were supported on the day by volunteers from Cranleigh-in-Bloom, U3A Garden Club, and Cranleigh Chamber of Trade.

For over 30 years, Rotary International and its members have been committed to fighting to eradicate polio across the world, and now the number of polioendemic countries has dropped from 125 to just two, with over 2.5 billion children receiving vaccinations, thanks to the significant help of Rotary.









This year it was doubly successful as I collected my KCAI (Kennel Club Accredited Instructor) accreditation award. After five years hard work, I am now recognised by the Kennel Club as an instructor meeting their code of conduct and standards of training. It's a great honour and one I am very proud of.

I also show my own dog Rupert, a Bedlington Terrier, and on his first visit to Crufts he won his class. I hoped he would do well in a large class and was delighted that he won. Rupert did so well and I am immensely proud of him. He behaved impeccably showing off his personality and his social skills in the ring.

It's something I'm often asked about..."How do you teach a dog to be social?" It's all about confidence and training. We ask a lot from our dogs but never stop to think about what they are feeling and seeing. I never allow a dog to be put in a difficult position (not mine or anyone else's) and I'm able to work with the group to encourage good play and behaviour.







### **ME & MY SHADOW**

#### by Marilyn Bailey

ho doesn't remember that moment of seeing their own shadow? Maybe it was having Peter Pan read to us that nudged us into seeing it 'attached' to our feet and following our every move. And those early recollections of being in the warm bright sunshine - all happiness and light - then moving into a dark and different place just by walking under a tree's canopy or around the corner into the shady side of a house?

As painters, light in all its forms is our greatest ally. The different grades of light or dark are known as their Value. The darkness or lightness of anything at all is one of the most important elements to be mastered if we want to give a sense of things looking real. Without light we would not see anything, of course. Without a mastery of handling the darkness or lightness things won't appear to be 'real'.

#### **DIFFERENT TYPES OF SHADOW**

There are just two kinds of shadows and from a Realist Painter's perspective each are equally important. Let me introduce you to one of them.

#### THE CAST SHADOW

This shadow is quite literally cast upon an object, surface, limb, feature . . . that we are looking at and that is to be painted. The reason why it is cast? Because there is something between the light source interrupting the light going any further.

On a sunny day, a tree's leaves, branches and trunk will cast a shadow on the ground. The tree is getting in between the sun's rays stopping those rays falling on the ground.



Olive trees casting shadows on their trunks and the ground


Walking on a garden path leading around the corner of a house, we are walking into the shady side where the house is interrupting the sunlight falling onto the path.

Whatever it is that is getting between the source of light and the ground, is absorbing (and bouncing) the light, preventing it going any further.

I find shadows very fascinating. Let's continue - this shadow which falls upon the ground describes itself. It describes which parts of it are near the ground and which are further away. Back to the tree trunk - where it comes out of the ground the shadow shape will be crisp and sharp. The branches and leaves will make shapes that become more and more blurred the further away they are. What this means for me and my flat canvas is that I will use clearly defined brush strokes for the sharp edges to the shadow, becoming more softly blended as the shadow changes.

The shadow itself is not just an approximate indiscernible shape but very specifically charts the overall shape of the tree.

These things are the very stuff of life to a Realist Painter. So much so that I have begun writing a Blog where I shall be going into them more deeply along with other highs and lows of studio life. # Supporting vulnerable children in Moldova



oldova is a landlocked country in Eastern Europe, bordered by Romania and Ukraine. It is slightly larger than Wales, has a population of 3.5 million and became independent in 1991 following the breakup of the Soviet Union. It is the poorest country in Europe.

The work at La Via will be supported in August 2019 through a ten day tour by the National Methodist Youth Brass Band who will provide a varied programme of concerts and musical workshops. As La Via has no musical instruments we hope to be able to donate some, so that in the future the children can enjoy musical activities at the day centre.





### STUFFED EGGS GRATIN Serves 4

#### Ingredients


8 large eggs, 60g mayonnaise, 60g grated mature cheddar cheese, 4 table spoons of breadcrumbs, 1 small bunch of parsley, Salt to taste, 60g sour cream, 50g butter, 2 tea spoons of sweet paprika, 8 filet of anchovies

#### **Preparation**

- Begin with the eggs, boil them for 8 minutes until they are hard boiled. Drain them and let cool off for 10-12 minutes, once they are cold peal them
- Cut them in half and with a spoon, remove the yolks. NB: Press the eggs gently with the palm of your hand on top of the chopping board and they will crack, this will allow you to peel them guicker
- In a large mixing bowl prepare the stuffing. Finely chop the parsley and add all the yolks you removed before, plus two of the half egg whites
- 4. Add the mayonnaise, sour cream, paprika and the salt. Mix all the ingredients with a wooden spoon until you have a smooth texture
- Now fill all the egg whites with the stuffing. Sprinkle them with butter, breadcrumbs and cheese
- Preheat the oven and set at 200 degrees/ mark 8 and bake the eggs for 12 minutes. After that the Eggs Gratin is ready to be served

This dish is great as a starter and canapés for party!





Ingredients

16 lamb cutlets, 4 eggs, frying oil, Salt and black pepper, 300g flour, 250g breadcrumbs

#### **Preparation**

- With a sharp knife make some small cuts in the edge of the cutlets to keep them from curling up. Using a meat tenderizer (or if you haven't got one the back of a medium kitchen ladle will work too), flat the meat down as much as possible without damaging the cutlets
- 2. You'll now need 3 mixing bowls: in one we will place the flour, in another the eggs which have to be slightly beaten and in the third one the breadcrumbs. Start by coating the cutlets in the flour, then put them into the eggs and finally in the breadcrumbs bowl. NB: Make sure the final coating of breadcrumbs is firm, if in doubt put the lamb in the breadcrumbs again!
- Pour the frying oil in a large frying pan, make sure it's enough to cover the cutlets once they're in the pan
- 4. Put the heat on moderate so the oil will not burn. When the oil starts to boil begin to fry our lamb cutlets until they get a nice golden colour. NB: With the oil at the right temperature, it should take around 2 minutes for each side to cook

Prepare a large serving dish with kitchen paper on top of it. Place the lamb on the dish and the kitchen paper will remove the oil in excess

You can serve the cutlets with a nice fresh mixed salad, the contrast between them will be delicious!

Recommended Wine: Primitivo D' Apulia





### 3 PANNA COTTA WITH STRAWBERRIES Serves 4

#### Ingredients

500ml fresh double cream, 8g gelatine sheets (you can find them in any supermarket), 80g sugar, 4 small moulds (cupcake or muffin moulds)

#### **Preparation**

- Start by putting the gelatine sheets in cold water to soften them up
- Pour the double cream in a medium sauce pan and heat until close to boil. NB: It's important that the double cream doesn't reach boiling temperature
- Let the cream cool off for 2-3 minutes, then add the gelatine sheets using a wooden spoon. Mix it nicely for a couple of minutes until the texture is nice and smooth
- 4. Pour the cream into the 4 small moulds and leave to settle in the fridge for at least 5 hours. NB: You can use a cupcakes or muffin mould, silicone or metal
- 5. Finally, cut some fresh strawberries and place in a small mixing bowl, dress them with sugar and lemon to taste. Give it a gentle stir. When the Panna Cotta is ready to serve, remove it from the moulds into individual small plates and top it with the fresh strawberries. Enjoy!
